Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey

Prices held unchanged on light type hens. Demand continued good for limited offerings for immediate movement. Some offerings for October pickup scheduled where replacement pullets available. Offerings of heavy hens barely adequate for a good demand. Limited new trading noted at 14½c. Prices paid at farm: Light Type 7-8½ M 7½-8. Heavy type TFEWR. TURKEYS — Trading spotty and generally limited to small lots for the forthcoming Hebrew Holidays. Other than contractual, movement too limited to quote prices.

Broiler and fryer live prices averaged 11.21 cents a pound this week. Prices paid ranged from a high of 13.3 cents a pound on Monday to a low of 10 cents a pound on Wednesday and Thursday. Sales for the week totaled 724,500 head down 8,100 head from last week.

cent slaughter steers, 23 percent heifers and the balance mainly cows. Overall finish of slaughter steers was not much different than a week ago and with 14 percent Prime and 73 percent Choice. This compares with 15 percent Prime and 73 percent Choice last week and 14 percent Prime and 74 percent Choice a year ago. Average cost and weight of slaughter steers estimated at 28.40, highest since April 1966 and 1150 lbs. compared with 28.26 and 1159 lbs. last week and 27.38 and 1165 lbs. a year ago. Heifer supply mostly High Good to Low Prime weighing 825-1000 lbs.

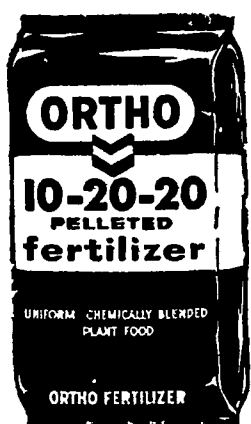

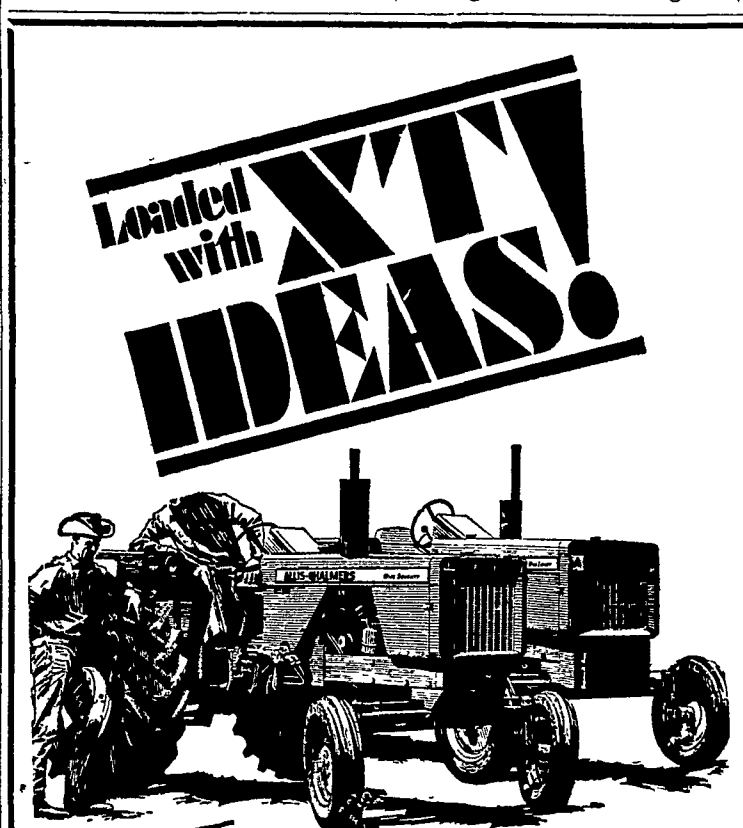

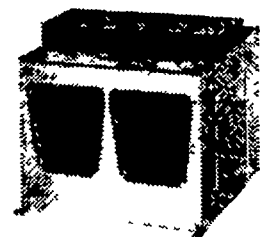
