Featured speaker for the event was Harry M. Kraft, Director of Vocational Technical Education in Lancaster County. Kraft told the 225 persons in attendance that new Vo-Tech schools to be located at the western end of Mount Joy; between Brownstown and Akron and near Willow Street. "They will meet the needs of our population," he said.

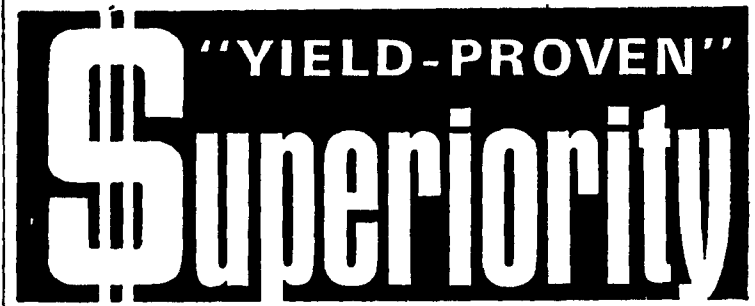
The director said the things to consider in this type of project are: 1, student needs; 2, community needs and 3, the labor market. To meet these needs the new school will have three levels of teaching — technical,

to prepare for college entrance; skilled, for the average student with equal emphasis on skill as well as technical and occupational, for students with lower grades.

The gross cost of the project was set at \$10.6 million with 16.5 percent coming from the federal government, 60 percent from

the state government and the remainder (about 44 percent) from local school districts.

The Rural Electrification Administration has made \$8.5 billion in electric loans in its lifetime. Ninety-four percent of this amount has gone to electric co-operatives.

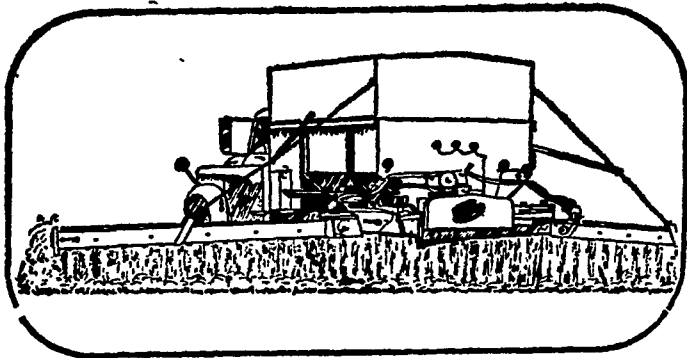
