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NEPPCO Official Calls For Unity, Leadership In The Coming Year

Strong leadership in dealing with the common problems of the poultry industry should be the primary goal for the year ahead, according to Richard I. Ammon, executive director of the Northeastern Poultry Producers Council (NEPPCO).

In a brief address to the annual meeting of the Council, held at a "Booster Breakfast" in the Penn Harris Hotel here last week, Ammon pointed out that "the industry has a golden opportunity to develop constructive solutions to some of its knottiest problems — develop practical common goals — and unite behind them."

He told his audience that the Council's primary objective in the year ahead should be to provide the leadership that will bring together divergent industry views for a united program of progress. The executive director pointed out that NEPPCO's attempt to develop this unity in the form of a National Egg Congress last year had not been successful, with the result that the industry presented a "splintered" image in seeking legislative objectives.

In other action taken at the meeting, six NEPPCO directors were elected, each to represent his respective state in the year ahead. They were Leon F. Lord, Fairfield, Me.; Hiram H. Frank, North Branch, N.Y.; Edwin J. Carev, Marion, Ohio; Russell C.

Latshaw, Barto, Pa.; Reino W. Tikkanen, Foster, R.I., and David L. Shetzlich, Baltimore, Md. Officers for the coming year will be chosen at the board of directors' first meeting.

Recognized at the breakfast

were members of the NEPPCO Thunderbird Club. This is an elite group that earns its "membership" by investing \$100 or more in the Council each year. At present its roster includes 31 individuals and companies.

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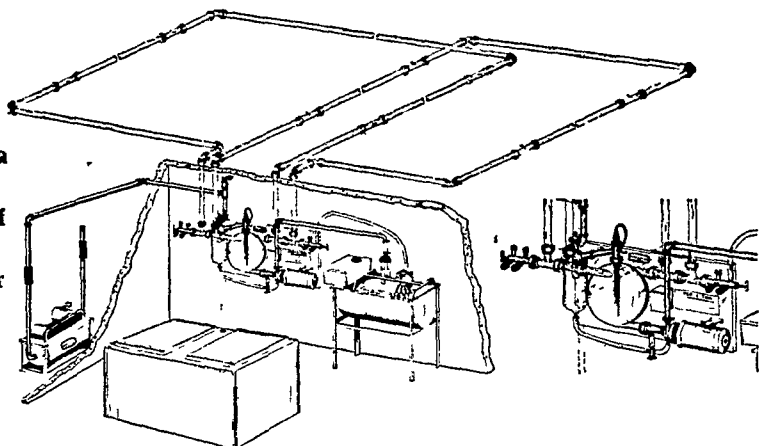
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
