

Farmer Gets 1½ Cents For Wheat In Bread Loaf

Today's farmer is receiving only 1½ cents for the wheat used in a loaf of bread, the Pennsylvania State Grange was told recently at Butler at its 96th annual session.

State Secretary of Agriculture Leland H. Bull informed the Grange that the price farmers get for wheat—\$1.09 a bushel — is the same price farmers received in 1936 when bread sold for seven to nine cents a loaf.

Secretary Bull expressed "concern" about the widening gap between the prices farmers receive for the products and the prices consumers pay for food in stores.

He also expressed concern about the "alarming" spread of gypsy moth in Pennsylvania. He said the moth, which destroys hardwood trees, was found in

and storing corn adapts readily and easily to mechanized handling and dry-lot operations. 5. Storage costs are relatively inexpensive. 6. Storage is relatively rodent free.

Disadvantages

1. The moisture per cent of corn to be harvested must be known to properly harvest and

to store with a minimum loss.

2. Top spoilage can be great if the right amount is not fed each day.

3. How to feed protein and mineral supplements as well as how to feed the high moisture corn, particularly in systems not designed for automatic feeding.

4. Extra equipment may be needed to handle the high moisture corn.

5. An extra silo may be needed.

6. Corn stored in this manner must be fed.

7. Power for conveying this corn by auger is greater.

8. More weight must be handled in this system.
