Vo-Ag Teachers Hear Jay Irwin

The Lancaster County Teachers of Vocational Agriculture held their monthly meeting late Tuesday afternoon at Pequea Valley High School Vo-Ag department and heard Jay Irwin, Associate Lancaster County Agent, outline the new tractor driving certification program that became effective in January 1968. Under the new child labor laws a 14 and 15-year-old youth who wishes to operate farm tractors and farm equipment on farms other than at home must carry a certificate.

A certified teacher is also required to implement the 10 or 20 hour course. For this reason, with the backing of Penn State, Irwin appeared before the teachers to explore the possibility of setting up the required classes of instruction within the county Vo-Ag departments to enable students to pass the written and driving tests needed to satifactorally complete the course and receive the wallet card certificate.

The problem of scheduling a course where all interested persons could attend was discussed and also the grade level where it should be implemented. No final plans were made.

"It is important to abide by the law," Irwin said. "A person could really be in trouble if an accident occurred involving a youth who was not certified."

The 4-H tractor clubs are planning to conduct a program to prepare interested members to qualify for certificates," Irwin reported.
