**Local Carcass Steer
3rd At Exposition**

The local entry in the Junior Yearling Class of the Steer Carcass Show that placed 4th on foot for Carl and Larry Herr, 840 Penn Grand Rd., at the Livestock Exposition in Harrisburg this week moved up to third place on the rail. The meaty Charolais dressed out at 66.9 percent with a 16.7 inch loin eye and only .3 on fat.

Herr said he was pleased that the home bred had Charolais-Angus Crossbred dressed out so well.

Of note is the final rating on the two steers above the local entry: First Place, dressed 64.2; 14.4 loin and 5 fat. Second Place, dressed 63.3; 12.08 loin eye and .5 fat.

Though these steers dressed at a lesser rate and had a smaller loin eye and a greater fat layer, they placed higher. They were Angus.
