

Parasite Control

The control of internal parasites in all types of livestock should get more attention; this is particularly true in animals under one year of age. With the local dairymen, where animals have been on the same land for many years, the young stock may become infected from the older animals each year. There are several types of stomach worms that draw the vitality from the animal. A sample of the feces submitted to the local veteri-

arian is the best way to learn the extent and type of infection. Cattle feeders that purchase animals from areas south of Pennsylvania should be sure to check the possibility of infection because many are loaded and will not make efficient gains. Prevent animals from eating feed or hay from the ground at all times is one good way of preventing more infection, this applies to inside feed bunks and troughs, not to pasture

5 Entries become the property of Lancaster Farming and the decision of the judges is final. Identification of the Mystery Farm will be published in each following issue.

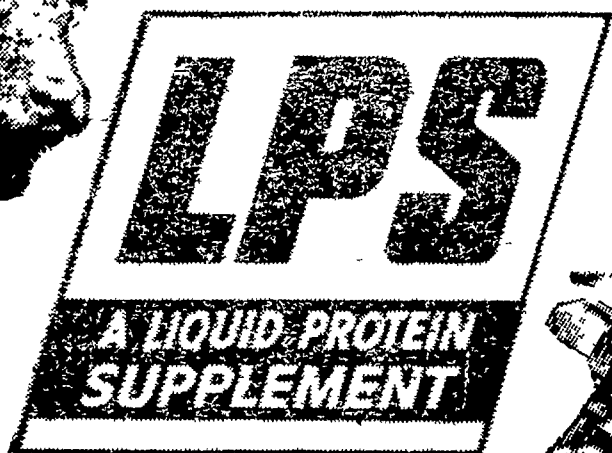
