## Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey

Prices of light type hens held unchanged. Demand continues aggressive for somewhat lighter offerings than past several weeks as producers often continue to hold for further production because of very satisfactory egg prices. In instances processors only operating part time due to lack of supplies. Offerings of heavy type hens generally short of a fair demand. Limited movement of colored hens reported at 12-13c. Turkey activity limited to occasional small lots of heavy toms. Prices paid at farm: Light Type Hens 7½-10, mostly 9-9½c, Heavy Type Hens TFEWR.

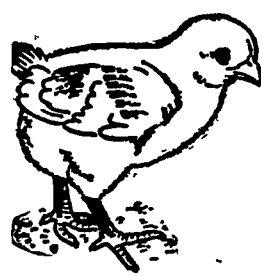
