**Postponement Of Frankfurter Hearings Requested By AMI**

The American Meat Institute this week formally requested the U. S. Department of Agriculture to postpone to May 1 a series of scheduled public hearings on revised standards for frankfurters.

The USDA on Dec. 25 called for hearings in late February and early March on proposals to permit the addition of poultry meat and byproducts up to 25 per cent of the total ingredients of franks and wieners without label declaration except in the ingredient statement. The USDA also proposed that the federal government prescribe the size and shape of hot dogs, limit fat content, restrict cooking temperatures, and dictate the sequence of processing operations.

Pointing out that franks are among the most popular of all meat products, the Institute told Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman that the nation's meat industry needed additional time to conduct studies and collect data on the impact of the proposed revised standards

Last year, Americans consumed 1,475,000,000 pounds of franks, an average of 60 per person.

"Since this proposal involves a matter of great importance to all segments of the meat and livestock industry as well as to the consuming public, it is imperative that decisions be based on facts and not on conjecture," the Institute told Mr. Freeman.

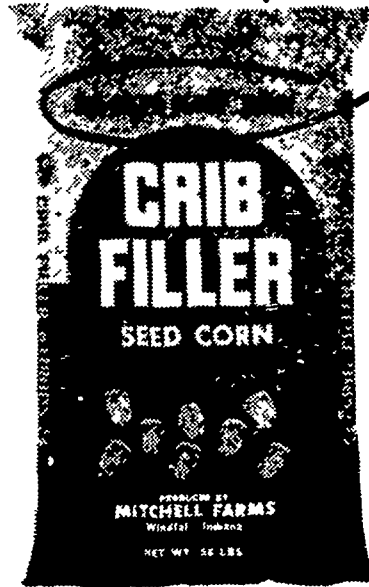
The Institute said that it has already undertaken a number of new studies to develop facts bearing on the various issues presented. The results of these studies, it said, should be available in approximately 90 days.

"Before throwing the issue of standardization open for public discussion, the Department (of Agriculture), we believe, should allow sufficient time for the necessary studies to be completed and analyzed," the Institute said.

The USDA had scheduled the hearings for Feb. 19 and 20 in Washington, D. C., Feb. 24 and 25 in Atlanta, Feb. 27 in Chicago and Mar. 3 in Denver.

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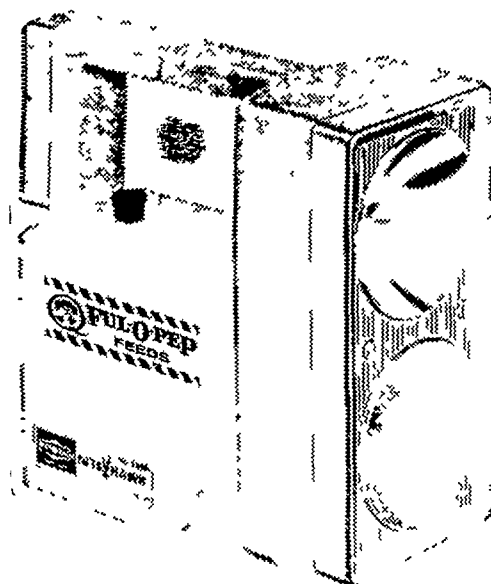
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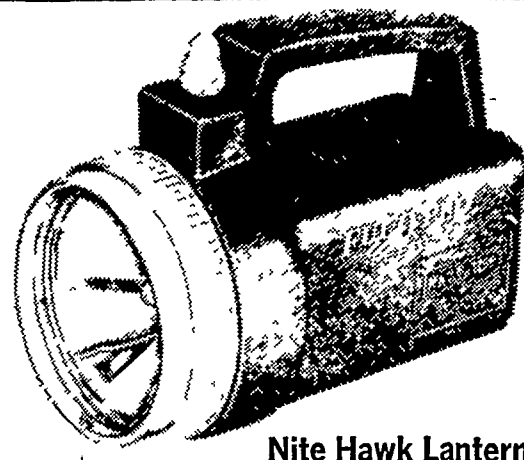
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
