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## Ladies, Have You Heard? . . .

### How To Debone Chicken Breasts

Place the chicken breast skin side down on cutting board. With a sharp knife cut through the white gristle at the neck of the keel bone (the dark bone in the center of the breast).

Bend back and press flat to expose the keel bone, then loosen the bone by running the tip of your index finger around both sides of the bone and remove it either in one or two pieces.

Working on one side of the breast, insert the tip of the knife under the long rib bone, working it underneath the bone and cutting free from the meat.

Separate the meat from the rib cage by cutting around the outer edge of the breast up to and through the shoulder joint, thus removing the entire rib cage.

Turn the breast around and repeat the method on the other side.

Working from the ends of the wishbone, scrape the meat away from each piece of the bone, then cut out the wishbone.

Slip the knife underneath the white tendons on either side of the breast to loosen and pull out.

You can remove the skin if you want and use it with the bones as stock for soup.

### Tips On Washing Durable-Press Garments

Wash and dry durable-press and wash-and-wear garments in small loads.

Wash whites separately. If possible, use laundry equipment with special cycles for these new garment finishes.
