Paul Martin, club leader, then talked about soil conservation until the meeting was adjourned.

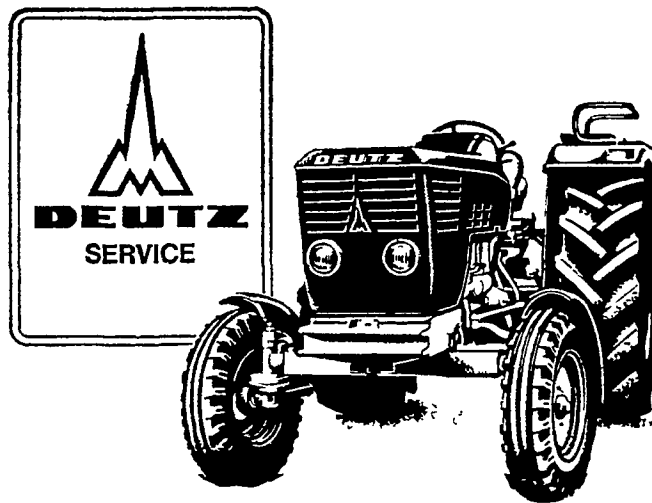
The next meeting will be held at the Hinkletown Church on February 21, at 7:30. Everyone between the ages of 9-19 are invited.
