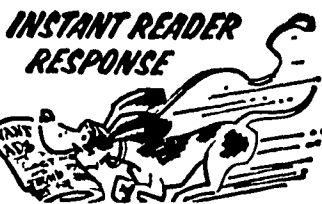

Pennsylvania Turkeymen Meet

(Continued from Page 17) Greater Harrisburg Area by advertising on radio and television locally. Mr. Konhaus also has a further processing operation which helps to use up the

buds which cannot be profitably sold as whole birds

Ira Gotshall, General Manager of Gottshall Processing of Birdsboro, is operating Pennsylvania's newest exclusive turkey processing plant with a capacity of about 600,000 birds annually. He, too, emphasized the advantage of Pennsylvania growers' nearness to markets and put much emphasis on quality birds in an attractive package.

Andrew Ludwig who operates the Ephrata Hatchery and grows approximately 90,000 turkeys, emphasized the necessity of good management practices and a good accounting system so a grower knows his exact cost. He feels that this would be advantageous to have turkey hatching eggs produced in Pennsylvania to help reduce poult cost. All of the panel members displayed optimism for Pennsylvania turkey producers who follow good management practices and produce turkeys for a specific market. James Hoover, Quaker Oats Representative, was panel moderator. Following the panel presentation, Roy Heckenluber, President of the Turkey Division, presided at a business meeting at which time the following officers were elected:

President—Paul Osborne, Biglerville, Penna. Vice-President—Andrew Ludwig, Ephrata, Penna. Secretary-Treasurer—H. J. Bicksler, Palmyra, Penna.

Following the business session, the group enjoyed a turkey dinner of Hershey Estates turkey. "Henk" Wentink, General Manager of Marketing and Farm Operations for Miller & Bushong, Inc., Rohrerstown, Penna., addressed the group on "The United Voice of The Pennsylvania Poultry Industry." He reviewed the activities of the Pennsylvania Poultry Federation for the past year and the plans for uniting all of the segments of the Pennsylvania Poultry Industry into one unified organization. H. J. Bicksler, Executive Director of the Poultry Federation, was in charge of the arrangements for the affair.

Regional Poultry Ass'n. Boards To Meet

The Boards of Directors of NEPPCO, Pacific Dairy & Poultry Ass'n and Southeastern Poultry & Egg Ass'n will meet jointly in Washington on April 22 to discuss matters of mutual interest & present a united front to Congressmen & government officials on current legislative & regulatory issues.

This will be the first time in the history of the poultry industry that the nation's regional poultry associations have gotten together in this way for united action. Last March, the Boards of NEPPCO & Southeastern held a highly successful joint meeting in Washington. As a result, both Boards not only agreed to meet again, but voted to invite PDPA's Board to join with them. On Jan 25 the PDPA Board officially accepted the invitation.

NEPPCO's membership is drawn from the 14 northeastern states, while Southeastern covers 12 southern states and PDPA spans 11 states on the West Coast. Together, these three regionals represent more than three-fourths of the nation's poultry industry, both in numbers of poultrymen who are members and in numbers of birds they own.
