PRODUCTION PER COW BELOW JAN. 1967 LEVEL

Production of milk per cow during January 1969 was well above a year earlier but on the whole below production of the January 1967 level. Average production for the month at 775 pounds was up 80 pounds from January last year but 13 pounds below the January, 1967 level.

Milk cow numbers are estimated at 1 percent below a year earlier and unchanged from December. Total milk production for the month was 563 million pounds up 3 percent from last year but about one percent below last month.

January was a rather pleasant month. Temperatures were mostly below freezing but quite steady. Precipitation was much less than normal. There was little snow cover for fall grains and forage seedings but the critical period is still to come.

During the business session minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Mrs. Edna E. Buckwalter. Melvin G. Rohrer read the treasurer's report. Harlan N. Keener read the auditor's report and John N. Thomas Jr. headed the nominating committee.

PENNA EGG PRODUCTION UP 2% FROM MONTH AGO

The Commonwealth's laying flock produced 284 million eggs in January, an increase of 2 percent from December and 4 percent from a year earlier. Rate of laying is 3 percent above December and 3 percent above one year ago.

The Commonwealth's flock size decreased 1 percent for January but is slightly larger

than our flock a year ago. This is the first month of decrease in flock size since July 1968.

Accurate Records Needed In Modern Dairy Business

Dairymen who fail to keep up to date with the ...

Ralph H. Hays, vice president of Marine Midland Bank, Inc., Buffalo, N.Y., a recognized agricultural banking representative pointed out that today's modern dairyman must keep records in much the same manner as city businessmen do or his chances of success are extremely low.

The conference sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service of The Pennsylvania State University was primarily designed for dairymen who work with large numbers of milk

records in order to increase their herd size. Approximately 200 Commonwealth dairymen participated in the session.

Recordkeeping practices should be encouraged, particularly in the same way a farmer takes time to do his barn and field chores. Hays said. Experience has shown that the dairyman's wife can be a valuable asset in this department, he added.

The banking official cautioned those attending the conference to carefully check the farm operation before attempting to secure a loan to expand the business. Many times he said, improvements in feeding and management program will rule out the need for additional funds to increase total income.

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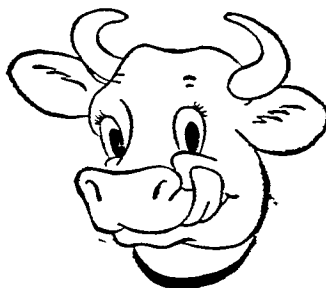


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
