His authorization permits handlers to again send "positive letters" to dairy farmers from whom they buy milk A dairy farmer who gets such a letter will be deemed to approve for one year, beginning April 1. deductions from his monthly milk check of three cents per hundredweight of his deliveries, unless he notifies the handler in writing that no deduction should be made.


