### Good Care Helps Cut Clothing Bill

If every family members develops good clothing care habits, his garments will give the maximum wear. And everyone can help to cut the clothing bill. Some ways to do it include

Put a garment on a padded or shaped hanger after each wearing. Close the zippers and buttons. If belts seem to pull the waist out of shape, hang them separately.

Brushing and airing garments regularly will give added wear. Use a soft clothes brush and brush with the grain of the fabric. Wool clothing needs to be aired and brushed more often than clothing of other fibers. For both appearance and wear. Keep the wrinkles steamed out of clothing.

Develop the habit of keeping clothing free of spots and stains. After each wearing check a garment to see if there are spots, and remove them at once. When you're traveling it's a good idea to carry a spot removal pad or stick so you can remove spots while they're fresh.

Plan to launder or dryclean clothing frequently so that heavy soil doesn't develop. Less treatment is needed for slightly soiled garments.

Keep clothes mended — catching the small seam break before it enlarges and splits the fabric not only saves time on your part but adds to the wearability of the garment.

### Care of Eggs

To maintain their high quality, keep eggs cold at all times before using.

Buy eggs that are kept in a refrigerated case take eggs home promptly, and put in your refrigerator at once.

Because eggs absorb odors easily, keep eggs away from foods with strong odors.

If an egg needs washing, wash it just before using.

Before storing, check cartons for any eggs with cracked shells. If you find some, use these first.

### What Is Freeze-Dried Food?

Freeze-dried foods are foods that have had the moisture taken out while the food is frozen.

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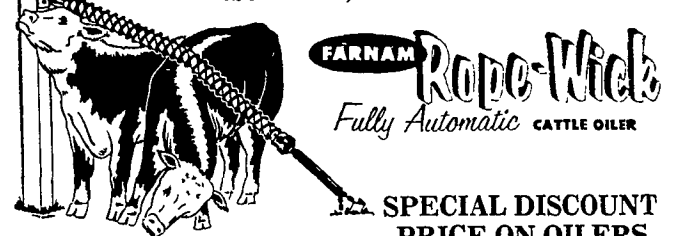
