ASCS NEWS WHEAT AND FEED GRAIN PROGRAMS

Final date to enroll in the 1969 Wheat and Feed Grain pro grams is Friday March 21st

l'o date, 267 farmers have eniolled in the Wheat program and 189 in the Feed Grain pro gram

The wheat program offers certificate payment of about \$135 per bushel up to 43% of the allotment on wheat harvest ed and diversion pavment for underplanting the wheat allotment To be eligible for certi ficate payment faimers must plant within the allotment, divert an acreage equal to 15%of the allotment, maintain the conserving base, and be planted within the wheat allotment on all other faims in which they have an interest

Under the Feed Grain progiam, pluce support and/or di version payments are earned by underplanting the feed grain base (coin, barley and soig hum) The minimum diversion is 20^c of the base and maximum diversion is the larger of 25 acres or 50% of the base, not the planted acreage, up to 50% of the base In this program, also the conserving base must be maintained and faimei must be within the Feed Grain base on all other farms in which he has an interest




