Pennsylvania State University.

"She will meet with government officials and gain increased understanding of important issues facing young people today," Reyburn said. "In addition, she will obtain a broader appreciation of individual citizenship responsibilities and opportunities."

Averril, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert M. Royer, was selected to attend the event in our Nation's Capital by officials of the Cooperative Extension Service. Four other members, C. George Brink, Jr. of Berwinstale; Joy L. Myers of RD1, Portage; Harold W. Brecht of RD4, Danville, and Claude J. Furlong of RD2, Johnstown, will participate in sessions with headquarters in the National 4-H Center.

One of the conference highlights will be a special breakfast where the delegation will meet and eat with their Congressmen. That same day, the 4-H members will discuss local governmental issues with legislators at their offices.

A 4-H member nine years, Averril is a freshman at Malmersville State College. She served her local 4-H Club as president, vice president, and secretary.

In high school she was feature editor for the newspaper, a member of the band, and was named to the national honor society.

She participated in the National 4-H Dairy Conference in Chicago in 1968, was a first place winner in the 4-H Demonstration Contest at State 4-H Days at Penn State, and won the Outstanding 4-H Photography Club Award.

In 1968 Averril was one of Pennsylvania's delegates to the American Institute of Cooperation in Blacksburg, Va.

Woodchuck Shooters, No Road Hunting

With woodchucks emerging from their burrows after lengthy winter naps, varmint hunters are thinking of the many hours ahead during which they can be matching wits and patience with groundhogs.

Although considered by many to be a nuisance, hunters are reminded that the woodchuck is a game animal and that regulations which apply to the taking of game also apply to the lowly groundhog.

Especially important is the new law which bans the practice of "road hunting," often a favorite method employed by varmint hunters in the past.
