Tips On Buying Frankfurters

Store franks promptly in the refrigerator and use within a week.

For best flavor, don't freeze franks. They lose flavor when held at home freezer temperatures just as do other cured and smoked meats. Plan to buy franks every week in the amount you plan to use within the week.

Careful Marking Saves Sewing Time
Careful and complete transfer of pattern markings to the fabric saves time.

Mark seams, darts, tucks, pleat lines, and gathered sections.

Transfer any other markings, such as center front and center back lines, that will help you put the garment together.

If you use dressmaker's carbon paper which comes in several colors, you can mark both sides of the fabric at once.

Use a color of carbon paper that has enough contrast to be seen but doesn't show through to the right side of the fabric. Do not use typewriter carbon paper.

Place the waxy side of the carbon paper against the wrong sides of the fabric.

Practice on a scrap of fabric before marking each piece.

Mark pattern lines with a tracing wheel using a ruler as a guide to help keep lines straight. Mark across the points where darts, tucks, or other stitching lines should end.

You may not need to use carbon paper on some fabrics—the

tracing wheel will leave an indentation in the fabric which may serve as a marking guide.

Because of their color, sheerness, or texture, some fabrics need marking with tailor's tacks. Directions for tailor tacks are usually given in pattern guide.

You can use chalk or pins for marking center front and fold lines.

Markings may be less accurate, as chalk is easily erased, and pins are easily lost.

On some fabrics you can press a slight crease to mark center front and center back lines and fold lines.

Handle Pesticides With Caution
