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near Knoxville from his 12 acre gentleman farm located in the outskirts of Rothsville.

Clair has worked with sheep all his life, showing at many of the major shows and working in the sheep barns for three years at Penn State So it will be sheep as the major enterprise for the Zerby family in their new farm home The local Vo-Ag instructor has been studying management methods and plans to pattern his operation into both a 300 head commercial sheep farm and a proving program for about 75 Registered Hampshires The program, to follow the methods used by Litton Charolais Ranch in Chillicothe, Missouri, will use artificial insemination from all the Registered ram lambs on the commercial breeding ewes Weight gains and feed conversion data will be recorded to give a basis of selection of sires and a pedigree background for saleable rams from his registered flock.

The farming program will be mostly grass and hay with only 8 or 10 acres planted in corn for silage

The present Zerby flock has its background from the Green Meadow Farm of Edward and Arthur Hess, Leola R1 and in the near future Clair plans to pick up 35 more ewes in Indiana of the same breeding to give him a good flock of related stock to start his proving program

Zerby came to Warwick in 1965 and has guided the Vo-Ag program there until the enrollment for next year will be at an all-time high of 43 students. Before coming to the local school he had worked for several beef breeding establishments in New York State including the management of a 1000 Angus cow herd He graduated from Penn State in 1960.

Mrs Zerby, the former Carol Kioeck from Litz, is a medical technologist and will help with the technical aspects of the proving program Clair hopes to institute Mr. and Mrs Zerby and then three children, Brian 6, Susan 2 and Judy 2 mo expect to be situated in their new home by the time Clair's duties are completed at the school
