State Parks Not Open For Spring Gobblers

Secretary of Forests and Waters, Maurice K. Goddard, announced last week that Pennsylvania State Parks are not open to hunting during the Spring "gobbler" season May 3-10, 1969.

Spring use of State Parks, predominately composed of family groups, is growing in volume each year. The public is widely dispersed throughout State park areas, hiking, boating, fishing, camping, and pursuing other outdoor recreational activities. To insure the safety of this large segment of the non-hunting public, it has been our continuing policy to close all State park lands to hunting during the Spring, Summer and early Fall seasons.

Major portions of 48 State parks are open each Fall for both small and big game hunting. This activity begins with Archery Season during the month of October, and extends through the Antlerless Deer Season in December. Predators may also be hunted or trapped during January and February of each year.
