He also said the Pennsylvania Association of Farmer Co-operatives has five objectives: to understand each other, to create public understanding, to be active in legislation, to give

recognition to outstanding leaders and to provide education along co-operative lines.

Boyd Gartley, Inter-State Milk Producers, likened modern agriculture to computers, pencils, typewriters and books rather than scythes, pitch forks and shovels. He said co-operatives

are not exempt from taxes as many people think. Of the 8,583 co-operatives in the United States, 81 percent are marketing; 37 percent are supply and 2 percent are service co-operatives. "Every business has some form of a co-operative as a part of it," Gartley said.

Serving on the Co-op Member Panel in the morning program was Mark S. Hess, Agway, Manager of Garden Spot Unit; David Yoder, Atlantic Breeders, General Manager; Carl A. Brown, Farm Credit Associations Man-

ager; Charles E. Cowan, Inter-State Field Rep.; S. A. Horton, Mount Joy Farmers Co-op Manager and Raymond Stoner, Producers Co-op Exchange of Coatesville Manager.

Youth asking the questions were Lynn Heistand, Al Wanner, Eugene Bollinger, Jesse Balmer and Henry Heishey. C. P. Brantly, President, Lancaster Co-op Council, Mrs. Muriel Everhart, Future Homemakers Advisor and Henry Givler, Area Supervisor, Vo Agr were also on the all-day program.

A quiz on Co-operatives was given to all youths present and the top twenty scores were given further forms to be completed in application to attend the summer Co-op Institute to be held in Shippensburg this summer.

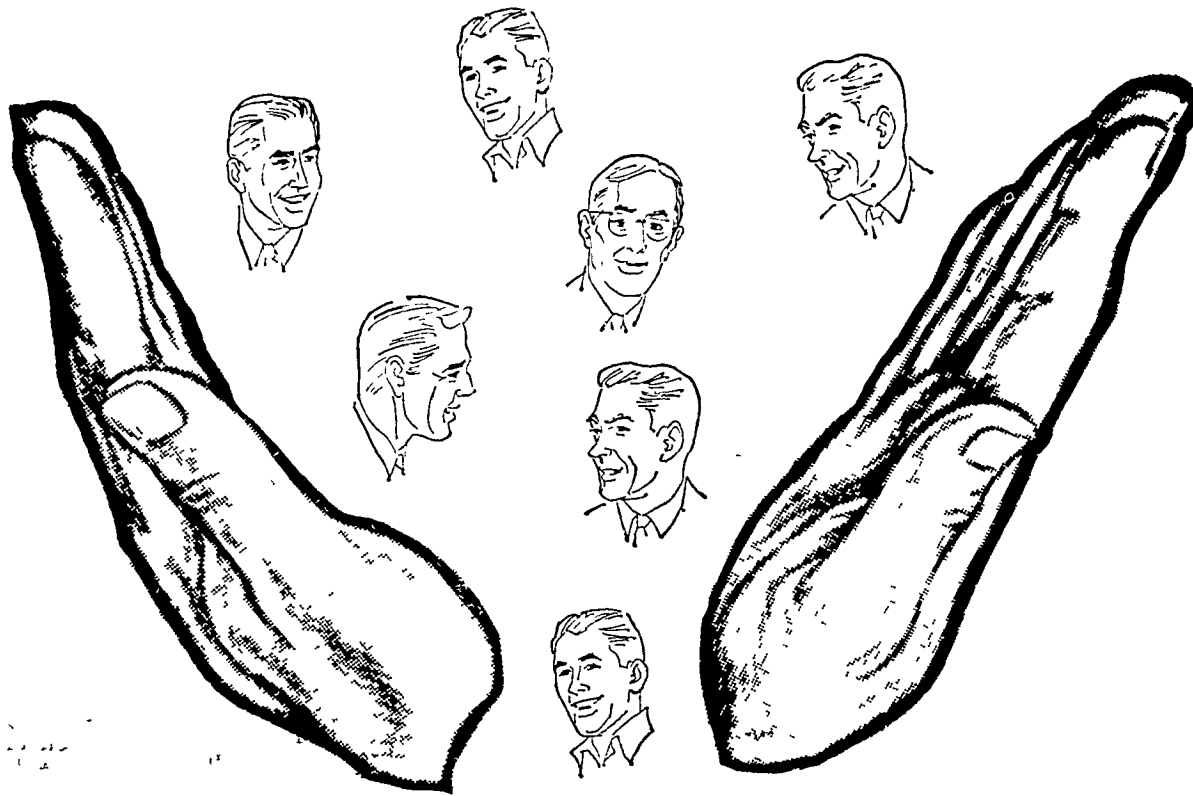

Quality of a rug or carpet depends on more than the kind of fiber, points out Mrs. Helen T. Puskar, Penn State extension home furnishings specialist. Amount and quality of fiber and construction used in both backing and face help to determine quality. No fiber, color, pattern, or construction can be called best for all purposes. Always read the label for fiber content which by law, must be listed by generic (family) name and percentage by weight of all fibers of which there is five percent or more.
