Air Pollution Damage To Crops Survey Topic

A statewide survey of air pollution damage to agricultural crops in Pennsylvania is being undertaken by the Cooperative Extension Service in cooperation with Agricultural Short Courses, the Center for An Environment Studies and the Department of Plant Pathology of Pennsylvania State University, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, the Institute for Air Pollution Training of the Office of Manpower Development.

The purpose of the survey is to collect data on agricultural crop losses caused by air pollution. County agricultural agents will collect the data and report it to the Center for Air Environment Studies for analysis.

The survey was preceded by a short course for county agricultural agents and other Extension personnel. This training session was held at The Pennsylvania State University, April 29—May 1.

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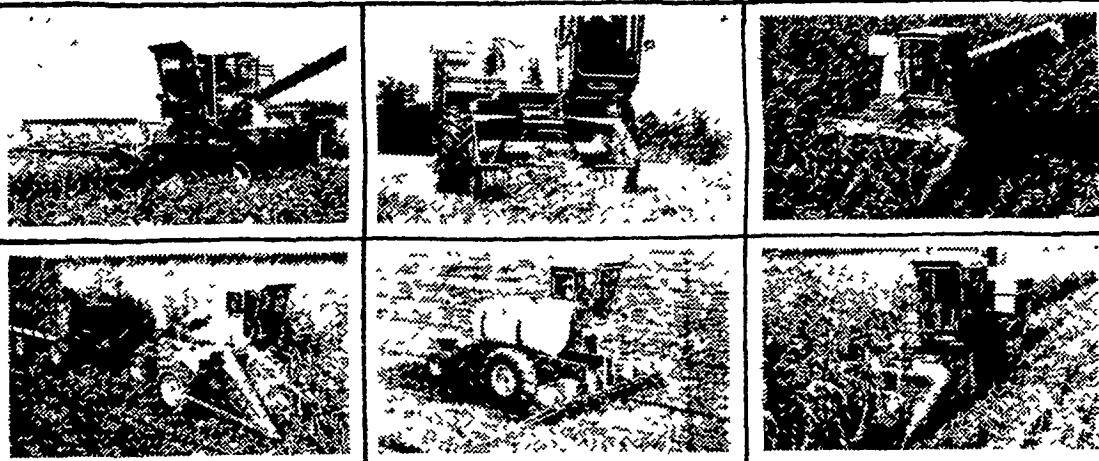
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
