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## Dedication Of Egg Laying Test Facility Set

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's random sample egg laying test facility at Pennsylvania Furnace, seven miles west of State College, will be dedicated at 10 30 a m June 7.

Taking part in the dedication are Jack R Grey, Deputy Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Robert E Lenker, of the General State Authority, Dr Russell E Laison, Dean of Pennsylvania State University's College of Agriculture, Dr Kenneth Goodwin and Dr. Glenn Bressler, of the University's Poultry Science Department; and Paul Turek, facility manager.

Penn State poultry science

graduates have been invited to attend the dedication which will be followed by a picnic.

The \$275,000 facility, consisting of a poultry house office building and manager's residence, became operational last September when 2,400 birds—109 from 24 breeders—were brought to Pennsylvania Furnace from pullet growing quarters.

Records are kept on egg production, size and quality of individual birds. The records are available to breeders and chick buyers.

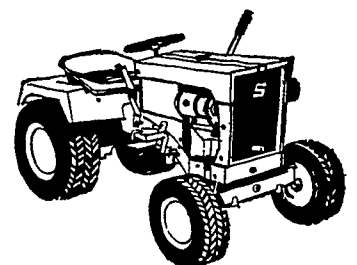
More acreage is being taken out of crop production yearly by expanding cities and roads than is being added by reclaiming deserts and swamps.

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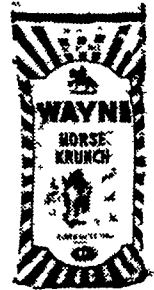
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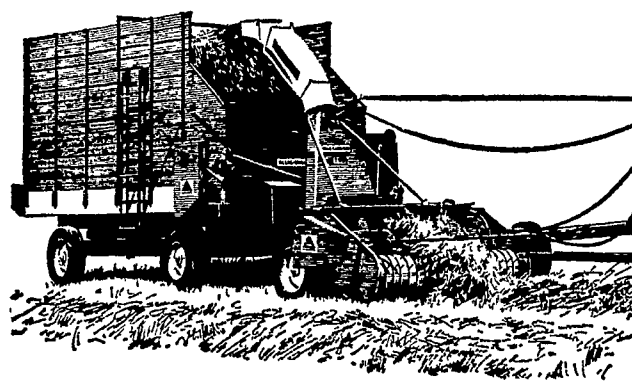
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
