How To Sew With Plaids

The secret of matching plaids is in the laying of the pattern and the cutting of the garment.

Not all patterns are suitable for plaid fabrics. Check the instructions on the pattern envelope. If the pattern is suitable, the instructions will say "extra fabric required for matching plaids."

The amount of extra fabric to buy varies according to the size of the plaid.

Buy at least one-half yard for extra large plaids.

Balanced plaids are easier to match than unbalanced plaids which have to be treated like a fabric with a nap.

To lay a pattern on plaid material, place the pattern pieces on the fabric so that the notches to be joined together are on the same color and size stripe.

Be sure the notches match at the seam line—not the cutting line.

Notches which should match are center front, center back, front armhole, front sleeve cap, and sideseam from hem to bust line darts.

To be sure that plaids match perfectly, pin and baste with small stitches before sticking on the machine.

Adjust tension and pressure on the machine so that both layers of fabric glide through the machine at the same rate of speed.

Beef Is Variety Meat

There are many ways to prepare beef and it's delicious no matter how it's prepared. Steaks, dry heat roasts, pot roasts, hamburger meat loaf, and stews are some of the more familiar cook-

ing methods. But beef is also used for luncheon meats, hot dogs, corned beef, dried beef, and bologna. Beef is true variety meat.

It's Window Cleaning Time

No matter how attractive your window draperies or curtains are they won't look their best unless the window panes are cleaned.

After the long winter months windows need a spring face lifting to erase the dust and streaks brought by weather on the outside and smoke, dust, and cooking on the inside.

One-half cup of ammonia in a twelve quart bucket of water will make your cleaning job easier.

For best results use a soft lintless cloth to wipe dry.

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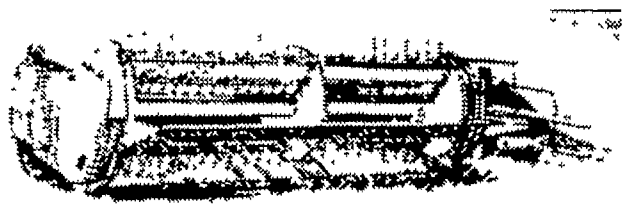


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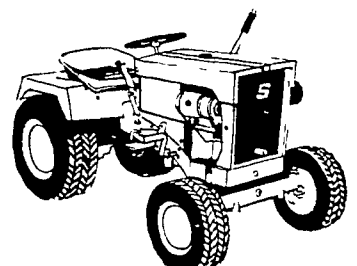
