### COUNTY PROJECT

Mrs. Nissley urged local societies to send their contributions to the County Project, Halfway House, in the near future so that the County gift may be given as one gift. Halfway House was begun as a project of the Lancaster County Council of Churches.

Halfway House is a home for boys who have been in trouble and are on probation and are in the process of being returned to society.

It was unanimously agreed that according to resolutions adopted at the State Convention, this is an opportunity to practice what is preached, since Farm Women are in favor of preserving natural resources and have gone on record on that subject.
