Slice green onion. Put vegetables and apple in a large bowl. Make the dressing (below) and pour over vegetables and apple in bowl. Mix lightly. Cover and chill in refrigerator about 1 hour. Makes 6 servings.

SALAD DRESSING

- ½ cup evaporated milk
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- Sprinkle of pepper
- 4 tablespoons vinegar

Mix evaporated milk, sugar, salt and pepper in a small bowl. Stir in vinegar, a tablespoon at a time. Makes ¾ cup salad dressing.

Storing Canned Ham

While all canned hams are fully cooked, not all of them are fully processed so they can be stored at room temperature.

Read the label. Canned hams that require refrigeration must be labeled "Perishable — Keep Under Refrigeration." They must be refrigerated during the time they are stored by the processor, wholesaler, and distributor.

Don't take a chance at home! Refrigerate so you can serve good, wholesome canned ham.

Some bonded fabrics undergo strict quality checks during the manufacturing process. Some stores key recipes to each week's featured meats.



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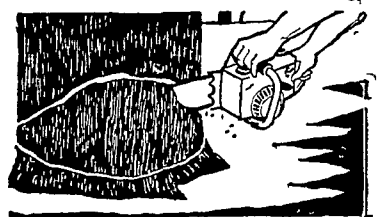
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
