Linford Martin, Gerald Martin, Matt Young, Thomas Bollinger, and Ruth Brubaker.

Professor Harold F. Doran, of the Penn State Agricultural Economics Department, who serves as institute coordinator, said the program is designed to teach those attending more about the free enterprise system in America. In addition, they will be informed of career possibilities in agribusiness and receive instruction in individual leadership responsibilities.

Included in the delegation are 155 first year scholars and 45 returning for the second time. The returnees, called agribusiness explorers, take part in in-depth studies concerning cooperative business affairs. In charge of the explorers is Boyd C. Gartley of Inter-State Milk Producers Cooperative, Cochranville.

"Those participating in institute activities," Doran said, "are all winners of a local cooperative contest and were chosen on the basis of scores of a quiz on cooperatives and a summary of local activities. Delegates represent 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America, and Future Homemakers of America."

A Youth Council, consisting of

of delegates from each of the 21 participating local councils, will provide the leadership for many of the functions of the institute. Jay Irwin, associate Lancaster County agent, will assist the council.

An adult staff of 12 will serve as speakers, panel members, and consultants. Fifteen others will participate as resource personnel in youth-led discussion groups. These resource persons are vocational agriculture instructors, county agricultural agents, and officials from farmer cooperatives.

Several of the conference speakers are Dr. Ralph B. Heiges, president of Shippensburg State College; Professor Robert J. Beiter, of the University of Maryland Department of Agricultural Economics; David Yoder, manager of Atlantic Breeders Cooperative, Lancaster; Will Ketner, director of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Bureau of Markets, Miss Sally Brown, of the Pennsylvania Rural Electric Association, Harrisburg; and Dr. Clare A. Becker and Dr. William M. Smith, Jr., both faculty members in the Penn State Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology.

One of the conference highlights will be the selection of

10 delegates to participate in the annual meeting of the American Institute of Cooperatives at the University of Illinois, August 3-7.

The 10 delegates, who will be chosen on the basis of their institute activities and scores on a quiz, will join with 900 other young agricultural leaders from the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico at the Illinois sessions.

On Wednesday evening and Thursday morning (July 16-17) agricultural leaders from all parts of Pennsylvania will join the youths for the annual leaders banquet and meeting. This group will discuss public responsibilities when conducting a cooperative business. John L. Walker, of Dairymen's Sales Cooperative Association, Pittsburgh, and Wilbur Seipt, of Inter-State Milk Producers Cooperative and P.A.F.C. president, will assist with the agricultural leaders conference.

General chairman for the institute is Walter Z. Loy, of the Farm Credit Association, Carlisle.

## All-American Dairy Show Taking Entries

Entry lists are open until August 20 for the Pennsylvania All-American Dairy Show, September 22-26, at the Farm Show Building, Harrisburg. This year's event will be the sixth in the annual series and is open to dairy breeders in the United States and Canada.

Premium lists and entry forms have been mailed to all former exhibitors. Interested dairymen who have not previously shown may obtain information and forms by writing to Thomas W. Kelly, show manager, Farm Show Building, Harrisburg 17120.

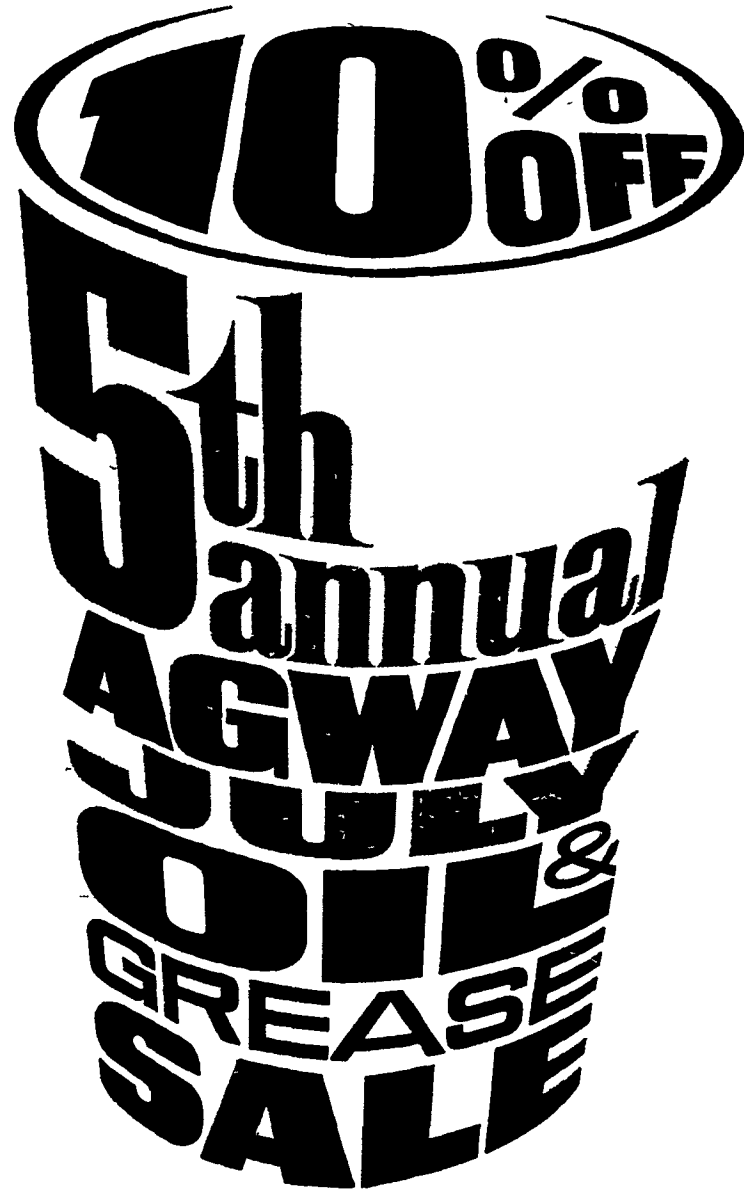
Breeders may enter purebred Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Milking Shorthorn. The Eastern National

Holstein Show will be held in conjunction with the All-American for the third consecutive year. The two popular breed sales—Holstein and Jersey—also are scheduled.

Cash premiums total more than \$50,000. By breeds the totals are Ayrshire, \$8,249; Brown Swiss, \$3,595; Guernsey, \$9,094; Holstein, \$11,935, which includes \$2,000 for state herd in the national show on a zone basis; Jersey, \$7,879; and Milking Shorthorn, \$7,295.

Additional premiums are provided for two all-Pennsylvania activities—the Pennsylvania Junior Dairy Show on opening day, and the Pennsylvania Black and White Show, the second day.

The All-American is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Dairy and Allied Industries Association in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture and its Farm Show Commission.



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
