Dry Summer Flowers For Fall Decorations

You can add more sparkle to your dry fall arrangements if you include some of the colorful flowers in your summer garden, says a University of Maryland horticulturist.

Most people think of leaves, weeds, greens and a few twigs when they think of fall arrangement, says Dr. Francis R. Gouin. But many of the flowering summer annuals make delightful additions if they are dried properly.

Some of the common ones that dry well are cockscomb, coral bells, daisies, delphiniums, goulds, hollyhocks, larkspur, marigolds, st. afloweers, sunburst dahlia and zinnia.

To dry these flowers, pick them just before they reach their flowering peak. Strip the foliage from the stem without damaging the flowers (If the stem is more than 3/8 of an inch thick, crush it with a rolling pin or wooden mallets.) Tie the stems of the flowers in a loose bunch and hang in a shaded place until they are dry. Air movement will help drying if it is not too strong a draft, but do not hang the flowers in the sunlight or the color will bleach out.

Decorate note paper.

Delicate flowers can add a personal touch to your note paper with very little difficulty, Dr. Gouin adds.

Simply select delicate flowers, florets, leaves or leaflets and lay as flat as possible on a double layer of tissue paper or paper towel. Place the paper and flowers between the pages of a heavy book and allow two weeks for the material to dry.

When the plant material is perfectly dry, position it carefully on the note paper, cover it with rice paper and paint liberally with a mixture of one part casein glue and one part water. Allow the paper to dry 24 hours before using.

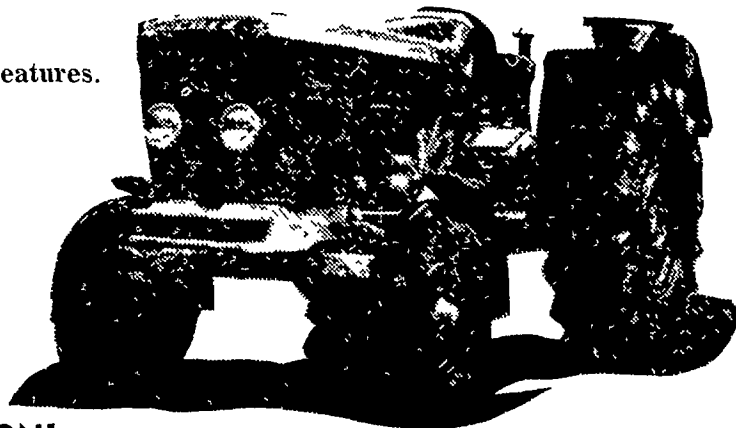
