## Lancaster FFA Youths Win At Region Dairy Show

Lancaster County FFA youngsters took Holstein reserve grand champion, senior reserve champion, and junior champion honors and also won 17 blue ribbons in the 14th annual Pennsylvania Southeastern Region FFA Dairy Show in Harrisburg Wednesday.

In addition, the youths took top honors in Holstein group of four. One youth won both master fitter and master showman honors in one class, while an additional 10 single awards in one of the two events also were won.

All blue ribbon winners are eligible to compete in the State Dairy Show to be held later this year.

Winning reserve grand champion honors and senior reserve champion in Holsteins was Earl C. Stauffer, of Cloister Chapter. Stauffer also won blue ribbons for the reserve champion in three-four-year-old competition, and for another animal in two-year-old competition. Addition-

ally, he won master fitter and showman honors with the reserve grand champion and fitter honors with his two-year-old.

Winning junior champion honors with a junior yearling was Jay C. Zimmerman, also of Cloister Chapter. Zimmerman won two blue ribbons, plus fitter honors for a senior calf and a senior yearling. He won showman for a junior yearling.

Winning two blue ribbons were Linford L. Weaver, Cloister Chapter, for a junior calf, and a three-four-year-old, Nelson R. Weaver, Cloister Chapter.

## European Corn Borer Report

Pennsylvania State University suggests that fields should be surveyed now for egg masses, as second generation European corn borer adults are moderate to heavy in light traps.

If 10 or more unhatched egg masses are found per 100 plants, fields should be sprayed every 4 or 5 days until egg mass counts drop below 10. Continue egg mass counts every 4-5 days.

Control The following materials are recommended for European corn borer control during 1969. These materials are listed with a short description on their effectiveness, toxicity, tolerance and limitations.

1. EPN 1/2 lb act/acre  
25% WP 2 lb  
4 lb/gal EC 1 pt
2. Carbaryl 1 1/2 lb act/acre  
(Sevin) 80% WP 1 3/4 lb  
50% WP 3 lbs
