Handle New Potatoes Gently

New potatoes now in stores are freshly dug so handle them as gently as you would apples or eggs, advises Harold E. Neigh, Penn State extension consumer economics specialist. Research shows that new potatoes can withstand up to 80 per cent more jostling one month after storage than they can at harvest time. Buy only what potatoes you can use in a week or two and then handle them with care.

Penna. Broiler Placements Up 35%

Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending August 23 were 1,210,000. The placements were 35% above the same week a year earlier and 21% above the previous week. Average placements during the past 10 weeks were 11% above a year earlier. Settings for broiler chicks were 1,995,000 — 15% above the previous week and 41% above the comparable period a year earlier. The current 3-week total of eggs set is 16% above the same period a year ago. In shipments of broiler-type chicks during the past 10 weeks averaged 12,000 — over 50% below the comparable period a year ago. Outshipments averaged 281,000 during the past

Livestock Business

The segregation of newly purchased feeder cattle comes to my attention at this time of the year, with another good corn crop in the making, and considerable activity in the cattle feeding business, no doubt there will be a lot of traffic in the livestock business this fall. Feeders are urged to do everything possible to prevent new cattle from coming in contact with acclimated ones. They should not be able to touch noses, or drink or eat from the same containers. Shipping fever takes a heavy toll among cattle each year and very strict sanitation and segregation practices should be exercised to prevent serious losses.
