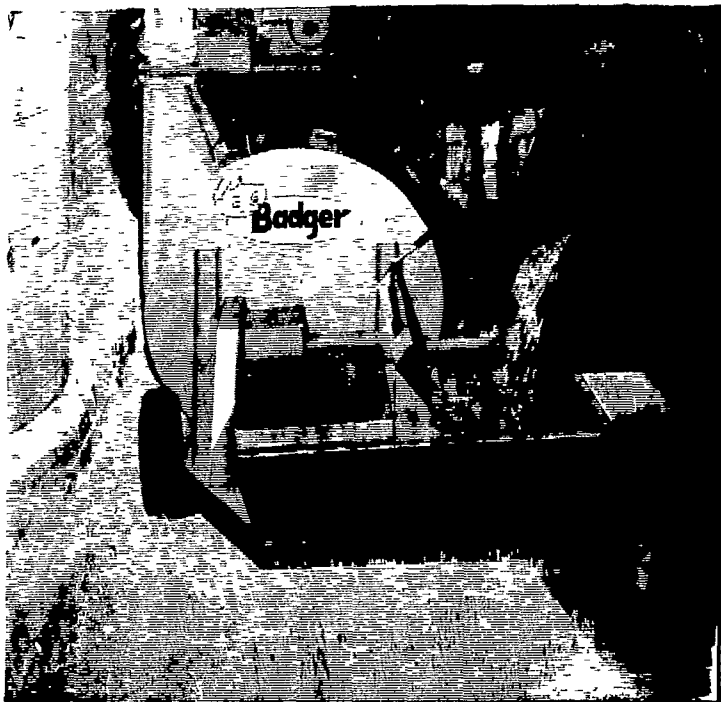

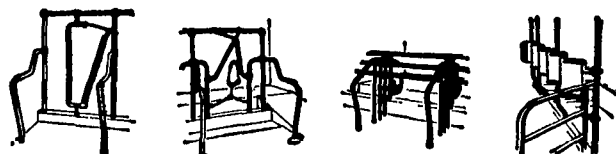

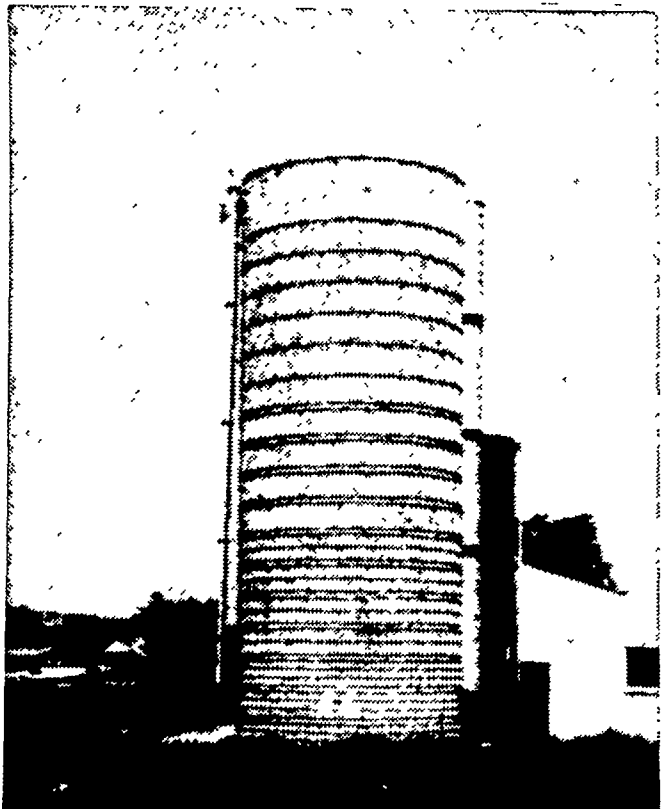

**FEEDING DIRECTIONS**

1. Feed 7 to 8 pounds of Ful-O-Pep Sow Ration Cubes per head daily during the flushing period from 10 days prior to breeding, through breeding.
2. From breeding until 5 days prior to farrowing, feed each animal 5 to 7 pounds daily in drylot or 3 to 5 pounds daily on good green pasture. Regulate the amount according to condition of the animal. The higher level should be used during the last month of gestation.
3. For 5 days prior to farrowing, to 5 days after farrowing, feed 4 to 5 pounds daily per animal. Feed 3 pounds per head the day after farrowing and increase feed at the rate of 1 pound per day until the sow is eating 10 to 12 pounds daily.
4. Feed 10 to 12 pounds daily per head to sows nursing average size litters of 7 to 8 pigs. Sows nursing 8 or more pigs should get 12-14 pounds or many be self fed.
