ford National 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 14, and will compete for awards at the national level.

Carol L. Howes, assistant State 4-H leader at The Pennsylvania State University, who announced the award selection, said she was judged on the basis of project work, leadership ability, and participation in county and state activities. The winner was picked from among the 50,000 4-H members who annually take part in the Extension Service youth education program.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert M. Royer, Averil is a sophomore at Millersville State

College. She has been a 4-H member 10 years.

A member of the Lancaster County 4-H Holstein Club and Garden Spot 4-H Community Club, she served as president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, news reporter, and game leader, and was secretary of the Lancaster County 4-H Council. She also assisted her local 4-H leaders with club activities and events as a teen leader the past four years.

The veterinary science contest winner completed projects in dairy, veterinary science, baby beef, sheep, sewing, flowers, horse, photography, and teen leadership.

Active in county 4-H events, Averil participated in officers

training achievement day, round up, and public speaking contest. She also took part in the Regional 4-H Demonstration Day, Regional 4-H Teen Leaders Conference, State 4-H Days and Pennsylvania 4-H Congress at Penn State, summer institute of the Pennsylvania Association of Farmer Cooperatives National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C., and National 4-H Dairy Conference in Chicago.

Averil was named Outstanding 4-H Girl in Lancaster County in 1968; Outstanding Teen Leader in 1968; 4-H Queen runner-up in 1967, and won the Banker Scholarship Award in 1968. She was an American Institute of Cooperatives annual meeting scholar in 1969.

Commenting on the values of the youth program, Averil said, "4-H project work has provided financial assistance for schooling and has enabled me to become friends with many people."

She is one of 43 Commonwealth 4-H members being selected as state contest winners in the various project categories.

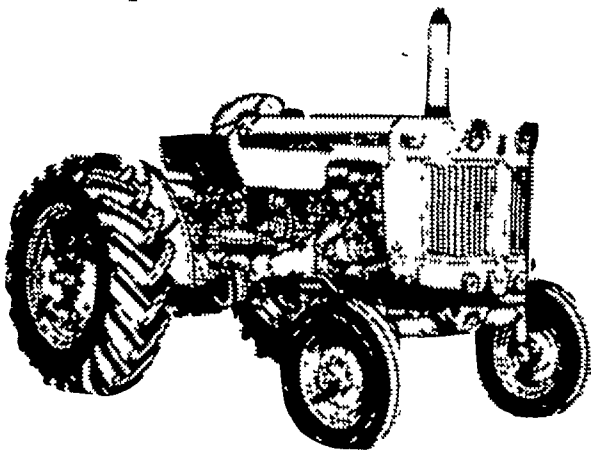

Lifetime Free Stall Housing



Cut bedding costs 75%, reduce labor for barn cleaning and cow washing; reduce teat and udder injury to the minimum — house your milking herd in free stall housing. Each cow provided a stall for loafing. She won't be stepped on, the rear curb forces manure out into alley for mechanical cleaning or washing. A few minutes twice a day cleans the stalls and curbs, bedding lasts almost forever if your stalls fit the cows. Popular sizes are 6'6", 7' and 7'6". Size 'em by breed.

Our free stall partition may be mounted on wooden head boards or we make a steel divider. Set the legs in 8 to 10" concrete curbs to hold and retain bedding. Stall floor can be soil, sand or gravel. Bedding — straw, sawdust, peanut hulls, ground corn cobs, etc. Should be installed with paved alley surface 8 feet wide for mechanical cleaning or washing.
