Prices of light type hens continued to advance ¼-½c. Demand continues good with bidding very competitive in the Pennsylvania area. Supplies barely adequate for full needs in Pennsylvania, adequate from other sections as processors fill operating time with some heavier colored hens and in instances with some heavy whites. Offerings of heavy whites short to barely adequate of a good demand for ready-to-cook needs. Prices paid at farm: Light Type Hens 9-11½c mostly 11-11½c in Pa., mostly 9½-10c in N.J. Heavy Type Hens 11½c.

The outlook for Pennsylvania's apple crop, previously predicted to be the largest since 1964, is unchanged according to a September 1 survey of conditions by the State Crop Reporting Service. The forecast of 510 million pounds, if realized, will be one-third greater than last year and one-fifth more than the 1963-67 average.

Peach growers also are looking forward to a good crop year, the best since 1960, with a 120 million pound production.

Pear production will dip 2 percent below last year, but the 3,200-ton prospective crop will be 8 percent greater than the five-year average.

vey indicated a 32,000-ton crop, 3,000 tons beyond the previous month's estimate.

The State's vegetable crops generally fared well from August weather. As a result, a September 1 survey of conditions by the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service indicated little changes in production estimates from the previous month.

Snap beans for fresh market, unchanged from a month earlier, were forecast at 40,000 hundred-

weight, while the estimated yield of the processing crop rose to 14,400 tons.

Both late summer and early fall cabbage crops remained steady with production set at 369,000 cwt and 242,000 wt, respectively.

Sweet corn for fresh markets was again estimated at 693,000 cwt, and the processing crop remained at 24,800 tons.

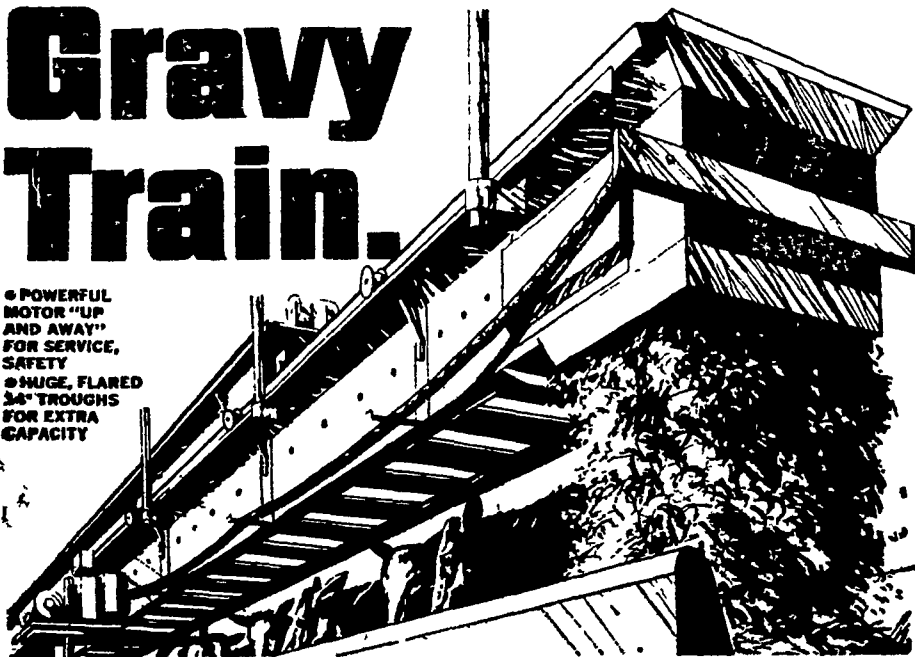
