Prices of light type hens held unchanged though bidding continued very competitive in Central Pennsylvania area. Demand good with local supplies generally barely adequate for needs. Supplies from outside of area were fully adequate though in instances colored hens from New England were being processed. Demand fair on heavy type hens with supplies barely adequate to short of call. Occasional lot of heavy whites reported moved at 45c farm. Prices paid at farm: Light Type Hens 9 11½ M 11-11½ in Pennsylvania, mostly 9 2-10c in New Jersey.

spoke on the Wayne Swine Feeding Program

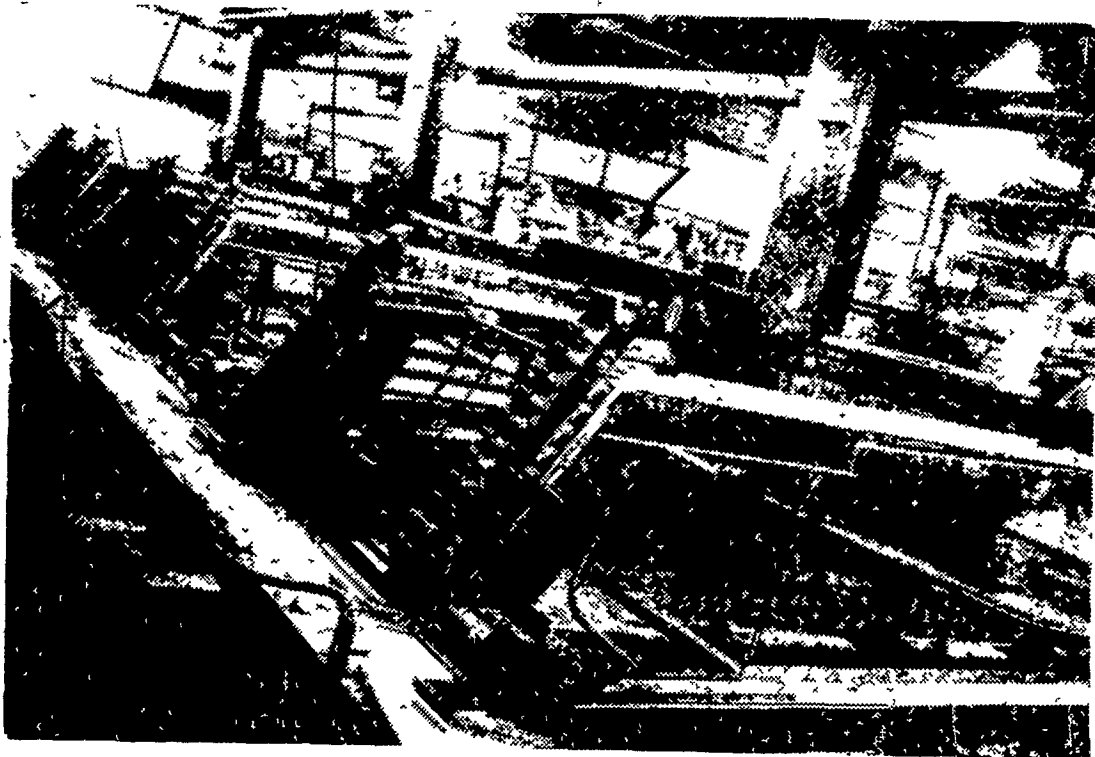
— Ray Hiestand and Robert Bucher, Allied Mills Representatives, conducted a hog demonstration and discussed performance records
