

USDA Proposes Additional Changes In Egg Products Inspection Regulations

Four new proposals to amend official regulations governing the voluntary inspection of egg products were announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

These proposed changes are in addition to amendments proposed May 27 to update the egg products inspection program. Comments received on that proposal prompted these further revisions.

The amendments proposed would

1 Lower the required temperature for frozen egg products from 10 degrees to 0 degrees Fahrenheit

2 Include the minimum holding time for the pasteurization of the fastest moving particle of product as well as for the

average moving particle of product. These limitations for "fastest moving particles" are half the time earlier proposed for "average moving particles."

3 Tighten the requirements under which inedible egg products may be processed in an officially inspected plant for non-human use. The amendment would require prior approval by the Inspection Service for the processing of this product under certain conditions and time limitations.

4 Adjust the cooling requirements for liquid egg products with 10 percent or more salt added and for whites that will not be subject to stabilization (a desugaring process) to further

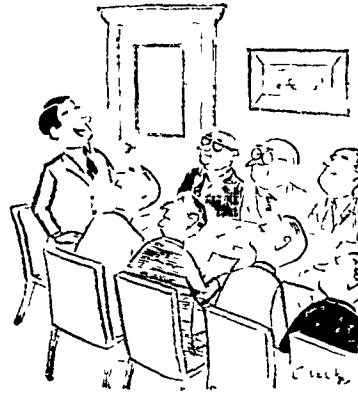

These proposed amendments were scheduled to be published in the October 7 issue of the Federal Register and interested persons may submit written comments (in duplicate) to the Hearing Clerk, Room 112 A, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. Comments will be accepted until November 10, 1969, and all submitted statements will be available for public inspection.

The voluntary egg products inspection program is a service provided by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service under authority of the Agricultural Marketing Act. Processing plants which use the service pay a fee to cover the Government's costs.
