More Hunter Respect For Landowner Urged

Hunters who ask landowners for permission to hunt and then respect the property once they are on it are performing a service for the hunter, the owner and fellow sportsmen

Nationwide, one of the biggest problems for hunters is finding open country The problem is not so acute in Pennsylvania, with nearly eight million acres of land open to public hunting, but with more leisure time, more hunters and more money for the average shooter, as well as the spread of suburbs into what was once open land, many have to travel much farther from home to find good shooting

Another reason is that many tracts formerly available to sportsmen now show "No Trespassing" or "No Hunting" signs

Often, these posters are the result of misconduct by hunters The landowners are generally not antisocial, but usually they have been "burned" by hunters

who barged right onto the property without asking and then compounded their sins by shooting too close to buildings, failing to close gates (perhaps allowing livestock to stray), careless shooting, littering, or possibly shooting farm animals or fowl

Sometimes this small minority will even park vehicles in farmer' driveways, blocking entry and exit Occasionally fences are broken down, signs are blasted by shotguns, etc

The obvious result of such activity is land closed to public hunting

Most sportsmen who ask for permission to hunt find it is readily granted If the hunter then respects the property of his host, invitations to return are often forthcoming

The sportsman may find the landowner a valuable source of information on where to find game And the host may join the hunt If he does the chances of a successful day are increas-

ed since the property owner isn't likely to waste his time on fruitless hunting

Respectful treatment of the landowner won't hurt one little bit, and it may result in a close, lasting friendship Why not try it?

Reach Peak In Oct. Waterfowl Migrations

Spectacular flights of wild swans, geese, and ducks, "honking" their way south in V formation, reach their peak over Pennsylvania in October, according to "Birds of Pennsylvania," a guidebook published by the Agricultural Experiment Station at The Pennsylvania State University

This fall migration of waterfowl is heaviest in October and ends in November, says Merrill Wood, author of the guidebook and associate professor of zoology at Penn State He reports that more swans than geese seem to migrate through Pennsylvania

October is also the month to watch for the beneficial hawks soaring south over mountain ridges, a route used to take advantage of up-draft air currents

Winter birds begin to arrive in October, Professor Wood reports He considers October a good time to get the winter feeding station in operation. The number of land bird species migrating south drops off in October from peak migration in September

One chapter tells what the bird watcher may expect to see each month The beginning of the fall and spring migrations are listed for each of the 156 species illustrated In each year, over 200 kinds of birds may be found in Central Pennsylvania alone
