

Spectaculai flights of wild ing" their way south in V for-The obvious result of such ac- mation, reach their peak over cording to "Birds of Pennsyl vania," a guidebook published by the Agricultural Experiment Station at The Pennsylvania State University

This fall migration of waterfowl is heaviest in October and ends in November, says Merrill Wood, author of the guidebook and associate professor of zoology at Penn State He reports that more swans than geese seem to migiate through Pennsylvania

October is also the month to watch for the beneficial hawks soaring south over mountain ridges, a route used to take advantage of up-draft air currents

Winter birds begin to arrive in October, Professor Wood reports He considers October a good time to get the winter feeding station in operation. The number of land bird species migrating south drops off in October from peak migration in September

One chapter tells what the bird watcher may expect to see each month The beginning of the fall and spring migrations are listed for each of the 156 species illustrated In each year, over 200 kinds of birds may be found in Central Pennsylvania alone
