

Pennsylvania Farmers' Association Annual Meet At Camp Hill Nov. 9-12

More than 1000 persons are expected at the 19th Pennsylvania Farmers' Association (PFA) Convention November 9-12 at the Penn Harris Motor Inn in Camp Hill. The PFA is a general farm organization with more than 12,000 farm family members and it is affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The main purpose of this convention is the adoption of policies and officers to guide the organization in 1970 according to John R. Pitzer, Aspers and president of the farm group. Voting delegate sessions with 125 delegates representing 46 county units will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Final adoption of policy will take place Wednesday morning.

The convention will center around the theme "Preparing for Action" and will open Sunday, November 9, at 7:30 p.m. with the traditional vesper service with the Rev. Kenneth Bowers, First United Methodist Church, Mechanicsburg, delivering the sermon.

Calvin D. Johnson of the American Truckers Association will speak at the Monday (Nov. 10) opening luncheon at 12 noon. Later Monday, Russell Wooley, development director, WQEX-TV, Pittsburgh, will speak at a ladies' dinner while Arthur West, New Jersey Farm Bureau president and American Farm Bureau board member, will speak at a dinner for county presidents.

John R. Pitzer, PFA President, will make his annual report during the Monday afternoon session of the delegate body.

Charles R. Old, PFA administrative secretary, will make his report to the voting delegates Tuesday morning. Harry Johnson, vice president, Harrisburg National Bank and Trust Company, will speak at a delegate luncheon Tuesday noon.

The Tuesday afternoon session will be devoted to two annual meetings of affiliate companies and program conferences. Annual business meetings will be held for the PFA Supply Co. a supply purchasing

Trespass Law

All hunters are reminded that an amendment in Pennsylvania's trespass law gives private landowners more protection than they previously had when posting land. Some land is posted against any trespass but some landowners use notices that permission is needed to hunt or fish. Hunters are urged to heed both of these signs. The amended law carries the same penalty for violating both types of posting. Should hunters be asked to leave private property they are advised to do so since a fine up to \$100.00 is provided in the new law for refusing to do so, or for re-entering after once leaving. All hunters should remember that most land is private property and the law has been changed to protect the landowner. Be considerate and courteous of the property right of others. Ask permission first.
