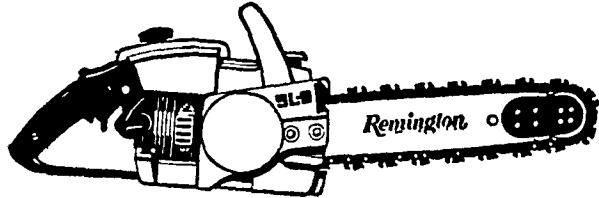

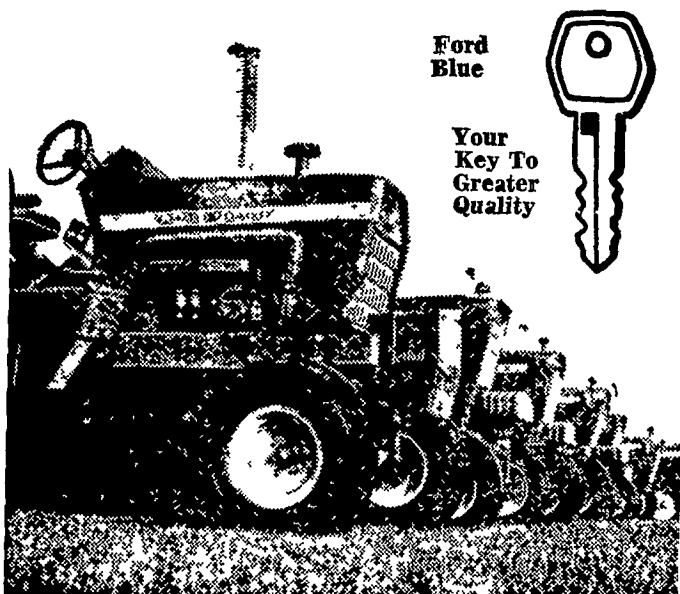

the operation to be strictly dairy, miniature style.

A typical milk goat averages two to six quarts of milk a day and is fed regular goat chow and alfalfa or good mixed hay. It takes the Fishers about one hour to complete the milking and the oldest milk goat they have ever had was 16-years-old. But mostly, they only stay in the herd until they are 8 or 9-years old.

The stock is registered in either the American Dairy Goat Assn. or the American Goat Society. Jacob is president of the Pennsylvania Dairy Goat Assn. and the family participates in the activities of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Dairy Goat Assn.

For young John, who is president of the Lititz-Manheim 4-H Community Club, it's pigs and not goats for projects "There is just no competition in goat projects" he says John also has abilities in art and drawing, and hopes to study commercial art when he graduates from Manheim Central High School in 1971.

"With this type of an election it is very important that all producers become acquainted with the program, give it considerable evaluation, and then vote in the referendum. Acceptance of the program requires a "yes" vote from at least two thirds of those voting, and representing not less than 50 percent of the production of those voting.

"All milk producers are urged to attend one of these meetings. We are interested in presenting all of the facts so that you will be more knowledgeable about the program, and to encourage you to take an active part in this referendum," the letter said.

Southwest Division — Supervisor G. L. Norris — Rains have left water standing in low spots, but weather seems to be clearing up for weekend. Leaves are coming down, which aids visibility, but there is much standing corn yet. Roads are no problem. Pheasants in good supply — better than last year. Good rabbit supply, though heavy grass and low ground cover sometimes make them difficult to see. Good turkey hunting.
