Prices of light type hens continues unchanged, though trended slightly lower within the range. Demand good. Offerings increased and often in excess of current needs as processors continue to have labor shortage which limits live running time. Occasional supplies of heavy whites noted at 14-14½¢ for a good demand. Prices paid at farm: Light Type Hens 8-11½¢, 10-11½¢ Heavy type hens 11-12½¢.

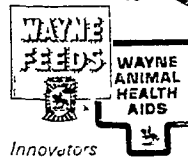
