**Special Field Report
On Hunting Conditions**

The Pennsylvania Game Commission each week during the general hunting seasons, provides information on field and forest conditions and chances for hunter success throughout the state. These are the mid week reports from the six field divisions for the second week of the general small game season.

Northwest Division — Supervisor L. E. Sheaffer — An incoming cold front with snow flurries is predicted. Roads are still firm, with most foliage down. Most corn has been harvested. Good supply of pheasants and rabbits, grouse and squirrels fair. Hunting pressure has been light on turkeys which are present in good numbers. Many hunters are wearing fluorescent orange — an excellent habit.

Southwest Division — Supervisor G. L. Norris — Hunting conditions are ideal. Almost all corn is harvested and the foliage is down. The ground is wet in many places. This has lowered grass cover, improving rabbit hunting. Many pheasants left. Turkeys are spotty — hunting will improve if we get any snow. Roads are good.

Northeast Division — Supervisor R. H. Morningstar — Due to recent heavy rains mud on snow tires are suggested for back road driving. Foliage is down and corn harvested. Plenty of turkeys throughout the Division and a good supply of rabbits and pheasants. Despite several route marker changes, Route 322 as seen on highway maps will remain the boundary line in reference to the turkey season.

Southcentral Division — Supervisor W. A. Hodge — Have had much rain recently with colder weather forecast. Foliage is largely down and most corn has been harvested. Turkey hunting good in mountainous areas, grouse and squirrels spotty. In the lower counties rabbits and pheasants are still in good supply. Dirt roads smeary.

Northeast Division — Supervisor A. J. Molski — All foliage down, good visibility. Recent snow in several counties has disappeared. Waterfowl hunters should be aware of rising waters on rivers. No fire hazards at present time. Leaves soaked forest quiet. Many large flocks of turkeys have not yet been scattered. Good carryover of pheasants and rabbits.

Southeast Division — Supervisor

T. A. Reynolds — Wet weather has helped get foliage off trees. About 95 percent of corn is harvested. Roads are wet but no problem. Pheasant hunting still excellent, rabbits and squirrels fair. Hunters are reminded that it is illegal to hunt in Safety Zones and are urged to be certain of their targets at all times before shooting Saturday, Nov. 15 is the final day of turkey season in this Division.
