Ornamental Horticulture Leads In Off-Farm Ag. Employment

The business of ornamental horticulture is the largest off-farm agricultural occupation in Pennsylvania, employing over 21,000 persons in some 1400 companies according to Richard F. Stinson of The Pennsylvania State University.

Dr. Stinson says the field of ornamental horticulture needs 800 new full-time employees each year, and 1200 part-time employees annually, for the next five years The business includes floriculture, nursery production, landscape services, greenhouse production, and turfgrass establishment and maintenance

Opportunities abound, he claims, for high school graduates to find employment in this vocation in the 68 communities where ornamental horticulture is taught The average Pennsylvania school offering such courses is surrounded by 3 golf courses, 6 landscape nurseries and 6 landscape contrac-

tors, 7 greenhouses, 6 flower shops, and 4 garden centers

The Commonwealth now ranks third among all states in the number of people engaged in ornamental horticulture exceeded only by California and Florida Dr. Stinson works full time with high schools and vocational technical schools to strengthen vocational training in horticulture He serves under a joint appointment with the departments of horticulture and agricultural education

Ornamental horticulture in "middle manpower" jobs requires at least one to two years of training beyond high school. Presently, only two Pennsylvania universities offer one and two year post-high school training in this field — Penn State and Temple Stinson believes such training should be available in six statewide institutions to meet the industry's needs by 1975

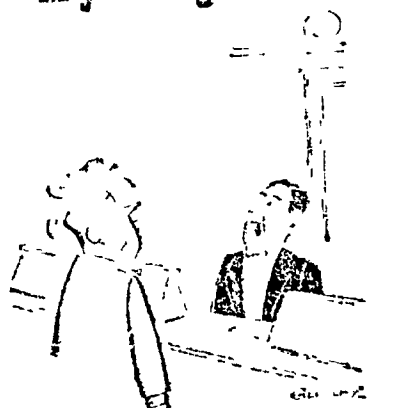

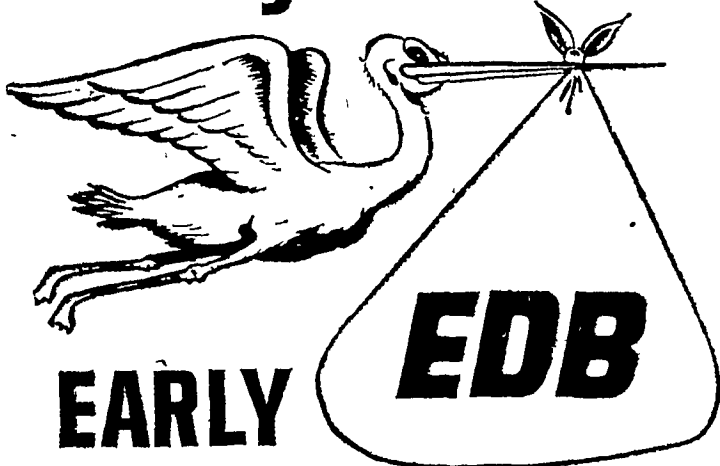
