"We have made every effort to see that each producer gets a ballot," State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull said. "However, there is a chance a few may have been overlooked. Any dairyman who has not received a ballot by December 8 should contact his county agent or the Bureau of Markets of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture in Harrisburg. A ballot will be sent out immediately."

All ballots must be received in the Department of Agriculture by noon, Wednesday, December 17.
