## Farm Council Favors New Site For Farm Show Bldg.

The Pennsylvania State Council of Farm Organizations is on record today as favoring a new Farm Show Building to be constructed on a new site

The Council voiced its senti-

ments at an annual meeting by passing a resolution recommending "construction of new facilities at a new location"

Harold Ely, president of the Council, said rebuilding the Farm Show complex on the present site, as advocated by certain groups, would be unsatisfactory because of parking and traffic problems

"On top of that, a renovated Farm Show building built on the present site would have to be a multi-storied structure because of the shortage of land," Ely said "Exhibitors and shows now using the building are aware of spectator reluctance to move from one story to another"

The Council also passed a resolution advocating that J. Lin Huber, currently acting as chairman of the Milk Marketing Board, be reappointed for a full term on the Board

Other resolutions

Opposed revision of the motor vehicle license fees

Favored wise use of agricultural land

Favored a study of the feasibility of establishing a school of veterinary medicine by Penn State

Recommended the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture receive sufficient funds to fulfill requirements of the meat inspection law

Ely, a farmer from Montrose, was re-elected president of the Council, Enos Heisey, Harrisburg, was selected vice-president and Wayne Readinger, Fleetwood, was named secretary-treasurer

Executive committee members elected Jay Hauger, Berlin, R D 1, John Pitzer, Aspers, Dean Fetterolf, Centre Hall; Reno Thomas, Beavertown; Burton Hetherington, Berwick, George Unger, New Berlinville
