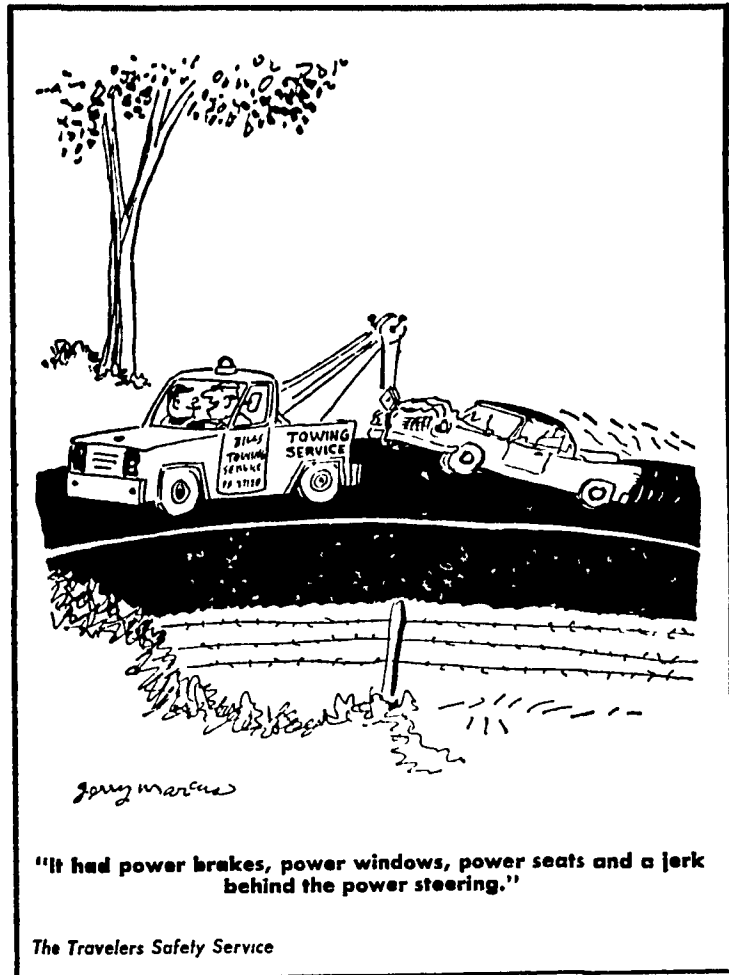

Winterize Pleasure Horses To Keep Them Healthy

College Park, Md., Dec. 18 — Now that cold weather has killed most of the parasite eggs in pastures, it's a good idea to "winterize" your horses to keep them healthy through the winter, says Dr. Robert Hammond, University of Maryland Extension veterinarian.

New drugs that are effective in removing bots and other internal parasites will pay off in a thriftier horse and better use of feed. Some of the new drugs can be given by injection, by stomach tube, or by mixing with the feed. They are relatively safe and very effective, Dr. Hammond adds. Contact your practicing veterinarian for names of drugs and recommended methods of treatment.

If your horse has not had a tetanus booster in the past year, it is a good idea to have this done now, as well, Dr. Hammond advises.

Tetanus organisms can be found in almost every horse stable; under these conditions, the slightest puncture would help cause lockjaw. Tetanus in horses is usually fatal. If your

unvaccinated horse is injured, an immediate treatment with tetanus antitoxin will offer some protection, but regular annual vaccination with toxoid is the best insurance, Dr. Hammond advises.

Lice can find a home in the long hair a horse grows in winter. If your horse is infested with lice he will tend to be restless and uneasy from the irritation. He will be too busy fighting these insects to be comfortable.

Spraying or washing with a safe pesticide should add much to your horse's well being. Pay particular attention to the ears, mane and tail, and be sure to rule the insecticide well into the hair.

To add to your horse's health comfort during the winter months, continue a regular grooming schedule — even though you may not be using the animal as often as you did in warmer weather. Grooming helps you control parasites, keeps the coat clean and stimulates the skin, says Dr. Edwin

Don't neglect the care of your horse's feet during the winter. Keep the pens clean and dry and pick the feet every few days to remove the dirt and check for problems. If you are not going to be riding much, pull the shoes and trim the feet as often as needed.

Remember that a horse is an athlete, Dr. Goodwin advises. Athletes need exercise to keep their muscles in tone. If your horse has several acres to run in — especially if he is with other horses — he will probably get enough exercise. But if he does not have an exercise lot, he should be ridden or exercised on a longe line almost every day.

A horse that is confined to a small stall during long winter months is likely to develop stable vices such as cribbing, stall weaving or stall walking, Dr. Goodwin adds.

and also developing new dairy products in addition to the research comments said: "It is absolutely essential that dairymen must be organized into much larger cooperatives and vastly fewer in number which between them will control the marketing of the major portion of the Nation's raw milk supply run by farmer directors who are willing to work and sacrifice for the majority."

The ADA advertising this year will include use of Junior Scholastic, Senior Scholastic and co-ed magazines to reach the teens, full page advertisements providing nutritional milk information in Today's Health magazine, the use of newspaper, spot radio and spot TV in addition to three NBC specials narrated by Hugh Downs and a new weekly half hour TV show directed to the teens entitled "Something Else". Membership in ADA & DC of N.Y. includes some 20,000 dairy farmers shipping into Federal Order #2 from New York, Pennsylvania and Northern New Jersey.
