HARRISBURG — Lancaster County 4-H Baby Beef showmen started Thursday very well at the Farm Show by first taking the Shorthorn championship and then the Hereford championship. But they failed in the Angus breed and that is where the eventual Grand and Reserve Grand Champion came from.

HARRISBURG — The Grand Champion pen of three 4-H lambs was shown by Donald Bollinger, Denver R2. Donald had the best pen of Dorset lambs and also the best individual in that breed.

Donald's brother Eugene also showed honors having the Reserve Grand Champion individual of the show with a member of his best three lambs in the Cheviot breed.

HARRISBURG — The Landrace swine show here Tuesday, was swept by a Lancaster County Swine Farm — Glenair Farm of Elizabethtown, owned by Glenn Baum. With two entries in the Senior Spring Gilt Class, the local breeder had all he needed to bring all Landrace swine honors back home.

Placing one-two in the class, Judge Harold Hart, Columbus, Ohio, picked Baum's first place gilt for champion and followed with his second place entry.

Kenneth Greenly, Glenair's herdsman who showed the winners said it was their first time at the farm show and they were surprised to win. "People complimented us on our hogs," he said, "but we had no idea we would go this high."

They also had the second place Junior spring gilt.

HARRISBURG — Lancaster County's Belgian Draft Horse breeder, Elmer Lapp Kinzer, managed five-second place wins and the reserve junior champion stallion here Monday. The champion is a stallion foal named Atwater Dick that was second in class to the eventual junior champion shown by Charles Orndorff & Son, Waynesburg R3 in Green County. Orndorff swept seven of 12 classes including the champion stallion, reserve grand champion mare and the reserve junior champion mare.
