Ready-to-cook movement fair but unaggressive despite sharply reduced slaughter schedules today as a result of the bad weather. Advance interest fair with occasional early commitment reported at 27c to New York next week. Less-than-trucklot prices mostly unchanged though occasionally slightly lower on Plant Grade. Undertone continues unsettled. Live supplies remain heavy and ample.

Negotiated trucklot prices 2-3# ready-to-cook broiler/fryer for delivery next week: U.S. Grade A Tfewr; Plant Grade 27c. Pool trucklot (Thursday arrival at terminal markets): U.S. Grade A 29-32 M 29½c; Plant Grade 28-30 M 28½c. Special packs including 1½-2, 3½ # sizes Tfewr.

Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey

Prices of light type hens often trended lower within an unchanged range. Demand fair but less aggressive than in past weeks. Offerings while somewhat less than early in the month, still fully adequate for current needs as buyers generally booked ahead for the next two weeks. Offerings of heavy type hens generally short of a limited buying interest. Prices paid at farm: Light type hens 8½-12 M 11-11½c. Heavy type hens Tfewr.

Dealer floor stocks ample on jumbos, other grades and sizes generally light but adequate with fancy mediums closely cleared. Demand for carton eggs is less active and only fair at best with most orders steady for the balance of the week.

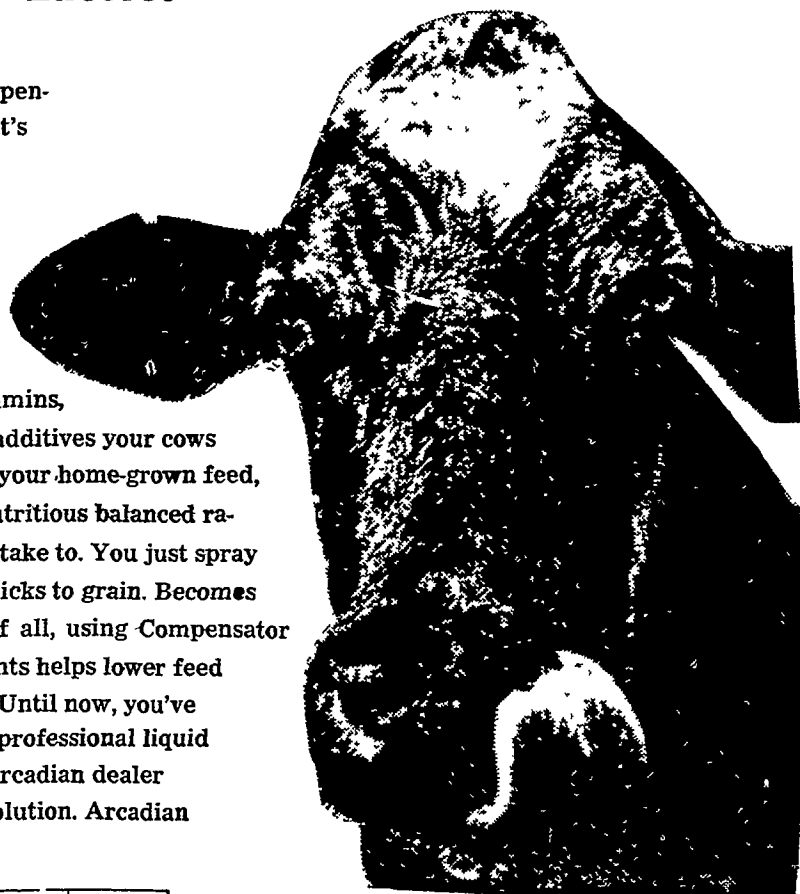

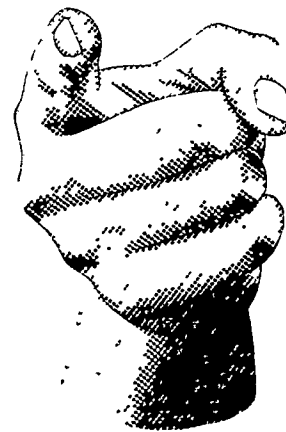
