A View From The Governor's Office

On the theory that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania itself should take the lead in all conservation activities, I last week ordered in end to environmental pollution from all State buildings, facilities and activities such as highway construction.

Specifically, each state agency under my control has been given until September 1 to formulate plans to bring the Commonwealth under enforcement provisions of the state's model Clean Streams, Air pollution and Solid Waste Management Acts.

In a preamble to this Executive Order, I pointed out that Pennsylvania is, indeed, leading the Nation in its determination to end pollution of our environment. Three years ago, we began a ten-year "Project Environment", and already the results are beginning to show.

Streams are being cleaned with the first acid mine water treatment plants. Burning culm banks are disappearing from our coal regions. Open space is being purchased and recreational facilities established.

Strip mines are being restored to recreate the natural beauty of our land. Disposal of junk and garbage is being managed on a State-wide basis for the first time. Strict air quality standards have been established.

In all this, we are making demands on individuals and industry to stop pollution practices that were acceptable in a different time — a different kind of world.

But the Commonwealth Government cannot make demands on its citizens without making the same demands on itself.

For that reason, the heads of the departments and agencies of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania have been ordered to provide leadership in the Statewide effort to improve and protect the quality of our air, water and land through the prevention control, and abatement of health hazards and environmental pollution from State facilities and activities. In order to achieve these objectives —

(1) Emissions to the atmosphere from State facilities and buildings will not be permitted if such emissions endanger health or welfare, or are likely to be injurious or hazardous to people, animals, vegetation or property, or are in excess of the standards established by Air Pollution Commission Regulations.

(2) Discharges to waters of the Commonwealth from State facilities buildings and activities will not be permitted unless such discharges meet the requirements of the Sanitary Water Board and are approved by that Board.

(3) Storage, collection, transportation, processing and disposal of solid wastes will be in accordance with regulations and standards established by the Department of Health.

(4) New State facilities and buildings will be constructed so as to meet the objectives prescribed in this order.

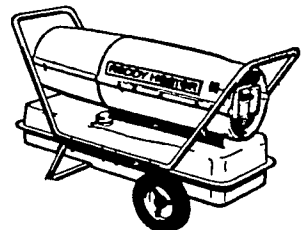
In order to facilitate budgeting for corrective and preventive measures, the head of each department and agency must develop and present to the Budget Bureau, by September 1, 1970 a phased and orderly plan for installing such improvement as may be needed to prevent pollution or abate such pollution as may exist.

Only then can we in State Government hope to make a meaningful contribution to the national effort to protect our environment.
