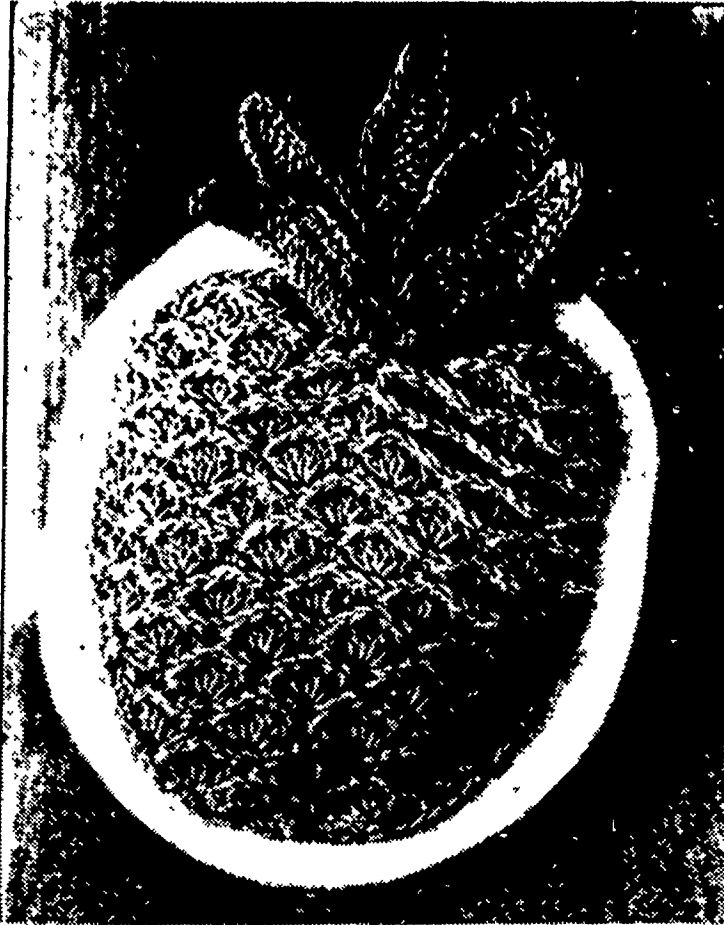

The quality of a rug or carpet depends on five factors.

- Good quality raw material
- Weight of face yarn per square yard
- Pile height
- Closeness of pile, lengthwise.
- Closeness of pile, crosswise.

When you shop for a carpet, consider:

- Size of the room.
- Activities carried on in the room.
- Family members—number and age.
- Amount of money you can spend.
- What you desire most—color, long life, luxury
- Color of furnishings which may influence your choice
- Major changes considered in life of carpet
- Time and energy for care and maintenance

Plan fewer dishes, with larger servings. Include more one-dish meals, and select some that you can prepare quickly, top-of-the-range fashion.

Meal Preparation Time-Savers
Keep meals simple. Plan them around the foods your family

Seive salads from a large bowl instead of arranging individual servings. On occasion, this plan will reduce clearing-away and dish-washing time.

Cook vegetables in their skins when possible. It will save time, flavor, and food values.

Small equipment will shorten cooking time. Use muffin tins or individual casseroles for meat loaves, pies, and puddings.

Select some foods that require little cooking or preparation time.

towel as a guide. Let stand at least 5 minutes before serving. Slice and serve warm with scoops of ice cream.

Collect menus and recipes for quick meals and keep an emergency shelf of supplies on hand to match some of the menus and recipes.

Bees Can Endure Cold

Bees can take good care of themselves in cold weather if they are provided with enough food, says William Clark, Jr., Extension apiculturist at The Pennsylvania State University. Some wind protection is helpful in conserving food and in saving the brood during early spring. Don't worry about snow on the hives; it's good insulation, reminds Clarke.

- ### PEACH PANCAKES
- 1/2 cup pancake mix
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1 egg
 - 1 tablespoon melted or liquid shortening
 - 3 tablespoons drained, diced canned peaches

Place mix, milk, egg, shortening and peaches in bowl. Stir lightly until batter is fairly smooth. Pour batter onto hot, lightly greased griddle. Turn pancakes when tops are covered with bubbles and edges look cooked. Turn only once. Makes 2 servings.

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
