Twelve Lancaster Countians are among 122 Pennsylvanians who became new members of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America at the association board's last meeting.

The 122 individuals and firms make Pennsylvania the third largest state group joining the world's largest dairy breed society. Pennsylvania is the second largest dairy state in the Northeast.

Forty-six states are represented on the current roster of new members. Wisconsin led with the largest state group numbering 161 followed by New York garnering 141.

These new members join the ranks of over 26,000 people actively breeding Registered Holstein-Friesian cattle that enjoy a reduced rate when registering and transferring their animals. Additionally, they gain a voice in developing policy for the breed by the selection of dele-

gates to their national convention as well as representation on the Board of HFAA.

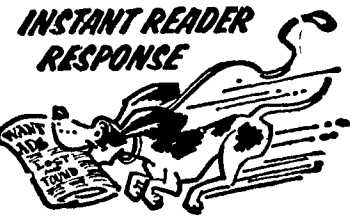
